Governor Harmon made the first seconding speech.

"I came on behalf of the Ohio delegation," he said, "representing the unanimous wish of the Ohio democracy to second the nomination of Woodrow Wilson for president of the United States."

The second seconding speech was made by Governor Stuart, of Virginia, to whom the Arkansas delegation yielded.

Referring to Virginia as "the mother of presidents" Governor Stuart referred to the president as "her illustrious son."

After Governor Stuart concluded, the delegates wanted to wait no longer, and cried "Vote! Vote!"

On motion of Senator Hughes, the rules were suspended and no ballots whatever were taken. The delegates simply cried "Aye" when the names of Wilson and Marshall were called, and Chairman James declared them nominated by acclamation.

Senator Kern, nominating Vice President Marshall, discarded a long prepared speech and simply said: "I renominate Thomas Riley Marshall."

The nominations of both candidates were completed four minutes before midnight.

Robert Emmett Burke, of Illinois, a delegate who announced he would not vote for the president, raised the only voice in opposition. He was elected as an independent.

Many delegates and spectators made a rush for the exits when the vice presidential nomination was made and Secretary James with great difficulty restored order.

Resolutions were then adopted appointing Chairman James and former Governor Glynn, of New York, chairmen of committees, respectively, to notify the president and vice president of their nomination.

Senators Hughes, Taggart and Vartaman were appointed to confer with the platform committee, which still was in session to learn if it was ready to report.

Practically all of the delegates remained but the galleries emptied quickly.

Senator Lewis, however, cut it short and merely thanked the crowd for its applause. The crowd wanted somebody to talk and there were cries for "Tom Hefflin" and "Irvin Cobb". Hefflin took the platform.

While Hefflin was talking the conferees returned from the resolutions committee and reported that the platform would not be ready for two or three hours more.

Senator Hughes recommended an adjournment.

BANDITS IN RAID KILL 3 SOLDIERS

Mexicans Lose Six and Several Wounded. Attack Not Unexpected.

San Antonio, Texas, June 15.—Luis de La Rosa today made good his threat to raid the border when 100 of his men attacked a small detachment of the 14th United States cavalry at San Ignacio, forty miles southeast of Laredo. His action cost him eight men killed and several wounded and many horses and some equipment. The American loss was three killed and six wounded, as follows:

Private Minaden, troop M.
Private Chas. F. Flowers, troop M.
Private Edward Katanch, troop M.

Wounded: Privates Thomas H. Ewing and James Rouch, troop I, seriously; Corporal William Oberlies; Privates William Minnette, Tony Harlina and Henry Matasoff, troop M.

Major Alonzo Gray late today was using every man of his little command in a sweeping search of the country about San Ignacio for a "hot trail." If it is discovered, a third punitive expedition may enter Mexico but at department headquarters, General Funston and his staff have little hope that Major Gray will be able to get into touch with the band. There was evidence to show that a large part had re-entered Mexico but other evidence indicated that some of them at least were scattered along the brush covered country on the American side.

The first shot fired by the attacking party was at the corporal of the guard at 2 a. m., a sentry had heard the voices of Mexicans beyond his post. He could see no one and called the corporal. While the sentry and corporal were talking the raiding party attacked.

THE TORRENS LAND ACT.

Will Become Effective July First Next Provisions of the Act are Here Related so as to Guide the People of County.

The Torrens system of registration of land titles will become effective in South Carolina July 1. Under its provisions the clerk of court is to appoint by August 1 three or more attorneys, who are to be examiners of titles; the county commissioners must provide a register of mesne conveyance for the registration of titles. The provisions of the act are assumed voluntarily.

The advantage of the Torrens system is that after land is once registered under this plan, there will be no further question of the title and it will not be necessary to have the title examined for any subsequent transfers of the land. The object of the system is to give a clear title to land.

The Torrens act fixes the fees that are to be allowed to the title examiners, officers and surveyors. The examiner is to receive a minimum fee of \$5 for examination of each title of property assessed upon the tax books at \$1,000 or less, and for each additional \$1,000 of assessed value he is to receive 50 cents. The surveyor employed under the provisions of the act is to be allowed not more than 40 cents per hour for the time actually employed.

In order to guarantee the title, and at the same time to protect against loss persons who by the system lose an interest in land not through their own negligence, the state provides an assurance fund, out of which claims will be paid. This fund is formed by a fee of one-third of one per cent of the assessed value of the registered land. This amount is turned over to the state treasurer.

GOVERNOR MANNING ISSUES STATEMENT

Says Take Care of Jobs Held by the National Guardsmen.

Columbia, June 18.—Ready to respond the minute orders are received from Washington for the mobilization of the South Carolina troops, Governor Manning and Adj. Gen. Moore remained on duty until after midnight to receive the official instructions to mobilize the South Carolina militia. The Governor's office was kept open throughout the night, and he remained in touch with a telephone at his side to start the machinery in motion which would gather the militia at Camp Styx.

The governor read the press dispatches telling of the call by the President for the militia for use on the Mexican border, and last night dictated the following statement to the people and the National Guard:

"I know that the National Guard will gladly and willingly respond to the call to aid in the defence of American rights, American lives and American honor. I feel certain those who employ men who are members of the militia will make satisfactory arrangements whereby the men can respond for service on the border without injury to their positions, so that South Carolina will sustain her enviable reputation for patriotism and devotion to duty. I know there will be the best of co-operation between the people and the National Guard. South Carolina stands ready to furnish promptly her quota of men for service in this crisis."

SECRETARY OF WAR ISSUES STATEMENT

Sa's Militiamen are Called Out for Service on Mexican Border. Not for New Expedition.

Washington, June 18.—Secretary Baker issued the following statement: "In view of the disturbed conditions on the Mexican border and in order to assure complete protection for all Americans, the President has called out substantially all the State militia and will send them to the border wherever and as fully as Gen. Funston determines them to be needed for the purposes stated.

"If all are not needed an effort will be made to relieve those on duty there from time to time so as to distribute the duty.

"This call for militia is wholly unrelated to Gen. Pershing's expedition and contemplates no additional entry into Mexico, except as may be necessary to pursue bandits who attempt outrages on American soil.

"The militia are being called out so as to leave some troops in the several states. They will be mobilized at their home stations, where necessary recruiting can be done."

FIREMEN WILL FIND WELCOME.

Orangeburg Makes Plans for Visitors. Crowds to Attend.

Orangeburg, June 18.—The 12th annual convention of the South Carolina Firemen's Association meeting will begin in Orangeburg on Tuesday, June 20, and continue through Thursday, June 22. Already firemen and visitors are arriving in Orangeburg and the festivities of the celebration are beginning. Besides the addresses called for by the programme James D. McNeill, of Fayetteville, N. C., Sherwood Brockwell, deputy insurance commissioner of North Carolina, and Chief Farmer of the Raleigh fire department will deliver addresses during the association meeting. The sessions of the association will not be secret and it is desired that the public attend these meetings and hear the addresses which will be made.


