MAJ. M. C. BUTLER MEETS TRAGIC DEATH (Continued from Page One.)

ler's body, will reach Washington Monday morning at 7:30 o'clock. Col. Butler will be buried in Arlington cemetery with military honors.

The report received by the war department from Lieut. Col. J. E. Machort, Fourth Texas Infantry, commanding officer at Alpine, regarding the death of Col. Butler, is as follows:

"Answering your telegram requesting further details regarding the death of Col. Butler, will state Col. Butler was sitting with me and other officers and citizens in front of the hotel about 8:45 p. m., July 29, when Mr. and Mrs. Spannell drove up in their car. Mr. Spannell driving and Mrs. Spannell occupying the rear seat.

"Mr. Spannell called Col. Butler to the car, reached back and opened the rear door, asking Col. Butler to take the seat with Mrs. Spannell. Col. Butler did so and the car immediately drove off around the corner of the hotel.

"After the car had proceeded about 600 yards into the residential part of the town Mr. Spannell shot and killed both Col. Butler and Mrs. Spannell, firing several shots into each one. He then walked to the jail and surrendered to the sheriff. Just how the killing was done can not be positively stated, as there seems not to have been any witnesses present. Col. and Mrs. Butler lived at the Holland hotel here, and both associated freely with Mr. and Mrs. Spannell, proprietors of the hotel.

"Both couples took frequent drives in the auto of the Spannells in the evening.

"Mr. Spannell seems to have been of an extremely jealous disposition. It is stated that he had frequent disagreements with his wife, who was a great beauty.

"The general opinion here is that Mrs. Spannell has never given her husband any just cause for his jealousy, and the unanimous opinion is that Col. Butler was absolutely innocent of any wrong. Whatever the cause, it appears like a cold blooded premeditated murder committed by a man crazed by jealousy."

Says Texas Folk Exonerate Butler. "Common opinion exonerates Col. Butler of all blame". Col. Gaston, commanding the Sixth cavalry, wired yesterday to F. W. P. Butler, M. D., of Columbia, from Alpine, Texas.

Col. Gaston telegraphed Dr. Butler that the body of Lieut. Col. M. C. Butler of the Sixth cavalry, killed at Alpine Thursday by a civilian, H. J. Spannell, was being taken by Mrs. Butler to Washington for interment in Arlington cemetery.

Dr. Butler was relieved to have reassurances from his late brother's immediate superior that Col. Butler was held blameless, though the information accorded with his expectations. Dr. Butler will meet the funeral party in Washington. The route which it was intended to take northward from New Orleans was via Spartanburg but this way is blocked by flood damage and the party will proceed from Atlanta to Washington via Bristol.
