TO CLOVER CLUB MEMBERS.

Farm Demonstrator Moore Gives Further Directions on the Cultivation of Clover.

Farm Demonstrator P. W. Moore has Advertiser in regard to the planting of clover. The clover club is receiving wide attention from farm periodicals and Mr. Moore is anxious that the club be made a success.

Laurens, S. C., Sept. 20, 1916.
Editor Laurens Advertiser.

Dear Sir:
The first step in our crimson clover sowing campaign, that of procuring the seed, is about ended and we will soon be ready to take the next step, sowing the seed; a step by the way very, very important to the successful growing of clover.

Nearly eleven tons of seed were shipped from Charleston Saturday. The banks all over the county will notify their customers promptly on arrival of seed. Let each club member see his bank promptly on receipt of this notice and take his seed out at once.

About three thousand pounds of additional orders have gone forward and will be filled at once.

Personally I am much gratified with this cooperative spirit on the part of Laurens county farmers. There has been no friction or misunderstandings in the whole matter and there is not going to be.

Pure culture for inoculating these seed has been or will be secured from the Agricultural department at Washington. It may be a few days coming on account of the large demand right at this time of year.

Now a few suggestions as to the sowing of these seeds so as to get, if possible, good returns, will not be amiss I'm sure. I shall try to be brief, plain and practical:

1. Let every man who sows clover this fall, if possible, sow it to be used as a cover for his land's sake, after gathering his seed next spring. Yes, you can sow it for feed of course, but let me urge the needs of the land;

2. Expect great things, yet, even wonderful things, for your land, but don't expect it all the first year for if you do you are doomed to disappointment.

Buy more seed if necessary to do this. 3. Depend largely on thorough inoculation for success. If you differ with me on this please forget it, for I have the abundance of proof. Nobody wants proof these days that Texas fever in cattle is caused by cattle ticks. Take it from me, accept the theory of inoculation for growing clover and act on it.

4. Directions will be given on bottle of pure culture for using it; follow them explicitly.

5. If you can get some soil where crimson or red clover (not bur clover) has grown successfully, when you get ready to sow, dampen your seed with a solution of equal parts of molasses and water, then mix with the seed about an equal amount of the inoculated soil. It will be all right to use both this and the pure culture from the government.

6. Sow on cloudy day or late in the afternoon; or if sowing all day, sow immediately ahead of the harrows that are covering the seed. Because if hot sun shines even a little while on seed, the work of inoculating described above will be more or less thrown away.

7. No seed as small as crimson clover should ever be covered deeper than an inch; one quarter of an inch is better.

8. The clover roots need compact soil to grow into as soon as seed ferminates. They simply must have it or the tiny plants will die as soon as some hot sunny days come.

9. Therefore don't plow land that you expect to sow to clover, unless you wish to wait one or two good rains to settle it before sowing.

10. Sow clover when there is a good season in the ground. If in cotton middles, have harrow or large scrape go ahead to prepare seed bed; then follow sowing with spring tooth harrow or scrape, and be sure not to let it go too deep.

11. If on open land where you have good coating of pea vines or sea stable, use disk or cutaway harrow, not to go too deep, sow seed and follow at once with smoothing harrow. A good roller or drag will assure you better results.

12. Keep a record of what you do and when you do it. Be as loyal to clover as you are to cotton and don't quit trying if you fall the first effort. I certainly don't want to think that the Laurens County Clover Club is composed of a bunch of quitters.

The Smalley's Best Picture.
