Dr. Moffatt to Preach.

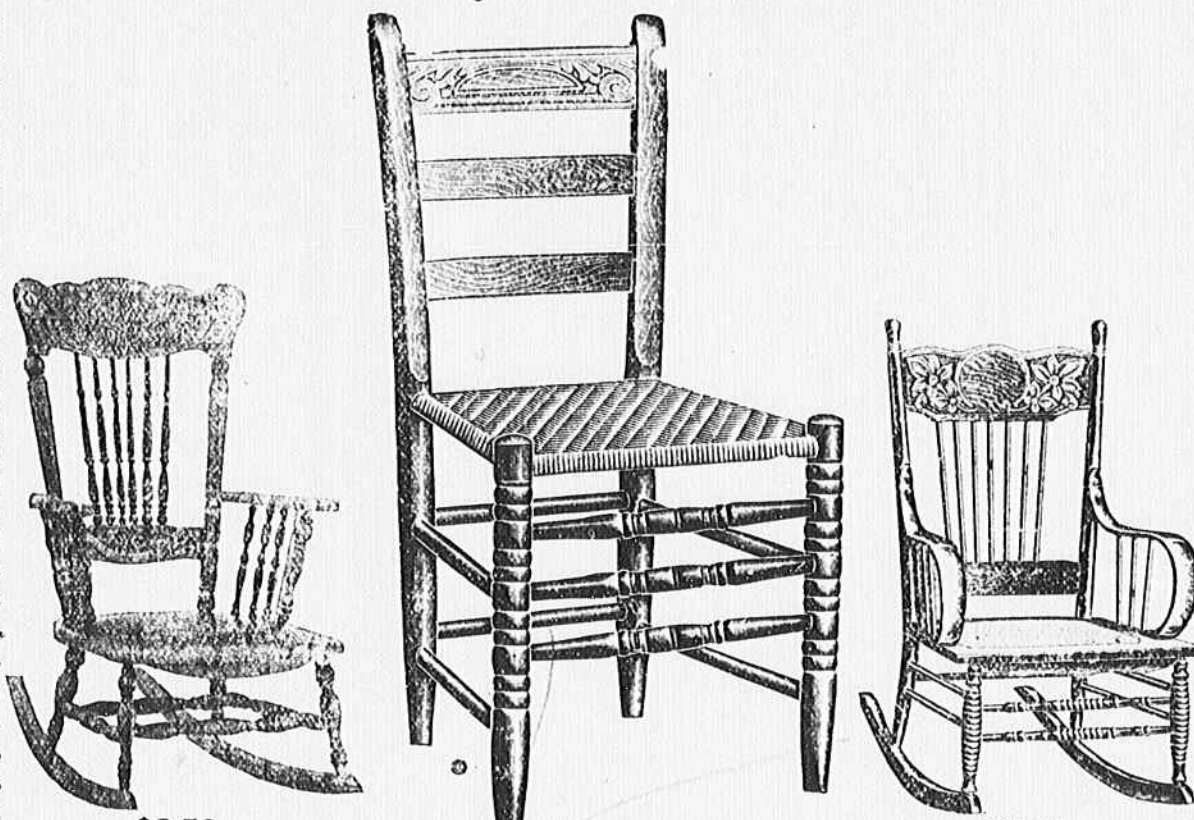

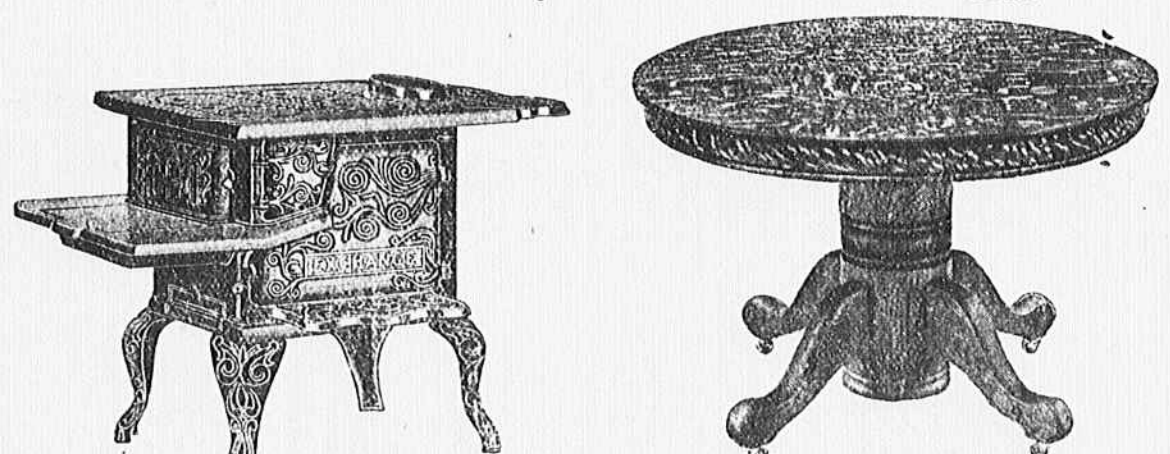
