GOOD ROADS.

THE POOR HOUSE.

We understand that the State Board of Charities and Correction is fathering a bill to change the system of caring for the paupers of the state. We believe that the board will recommend the adoption of a system whereby the paupers will be cared for in district almshouse rather than in county alms houses. The board hopes to secure the advantages that generally result from more compact organization and the plan to us looks practical. However, if the lan of the board is not adopted, some measures should be taken by our delegation to improve the condition of our own paupers in the almshouse between here and Clinton. The Advertiser is not criticising those who actually conduct the "poor house", as it is called, or the county officers who are responsible for it. The place is doubtless conducted as well as the money provided for it justifies or surely as the public demands, but it is not to our credit nevertheless and it should be improved upon.

Both of these measures will be introduced in the legislature during the first days of the ses-

According to the estimate of Comptroller-General Sawyer, released for publication Sunday morning, the various institutions and departments of the government are asking for appropriations amounting to \$3,159,-691.57, while the estimated revenue of the state for 1917 will be \$2,334,756.88. Mr. Sawyer states that it will take a levy of 10 mills to meet the amounts asked for 1917.

Mr. Sawyer states that the general assembly appropriated \$2,596,169.08, whereas the revenue for 1916 will amount to only \$2,301,281.30, creating a deficit of practically \$295,000, or a levy of one mill. The levy provided by the legislature for 1916 was 61-2

The condition of the finances of the state is expected to be the cause of drastic legislation affecting the taxation system of South Carolina. What attempts will be made to amend the existing law is not known at this time, but it is considered a safe bet that some such legislation will be at-

The investigators of the state board of charities and corrections into the conditions of penal and charitable institutions of the state may result in legislation to alleviate the hard lot of the poor, the feeble-minded and the imbecles. It is thought that bills making lighter the burdens of these classes of unfortunates will be intro-

A bill providing for rural credits will be introduced as will one for workingmen's compensation. In view of the recent strikes in textile communities it is not unlikely that other labor legislation will be attempted.


