Mr. Hodges' plan in short, is to cover every acre every fall with crimson clover sowed between the 15th of September and the 15th of October, and scratched in lightly with sweep or harriw. The plan to suit him as 1 see it must satisfy a four-fold purpose: 1-furnish seed for fall sowing, with some to sell if possible; 2-furnish a maximum growth of humus; 3-furnish a maximum storage of nitrogen for cotton, and 4-furnish the longest possible period for growing cotton. The man who would make it go must get these four things large in his mind and sit up late at nights working them out. The first three of these, of course, are worked out together: 1by leaving all lands to be planted to
