

ONE QUART A MONTH UNDER DURANT BILL

Manning Senator's Liquor Measure Does Not Propose to Make State Bone Dry.

Columbia, Feb. 12.—There has arisen some confusion between the Evans-Friday-Nickles "bone-dry" and the Durant "quart-a-month" liquor bill. The error ought to be patent. Senator Durant's was erroneously credited with the Evans-Friday-Nickles bill. The Durant bill allows a quart a month under restrictions. The Evans-Friday-Nickles bill says it shall be unlawful to ship, have in possession, store or keep intoxicating liquors. This is not in the Durant bill, which allows persons to keep, certain liquor but permits only a quart a month to be brought into the State to each citizen.

The Evans-Friday-Nickles bill says it shall be unlawful for any person to use or drink any whiskey, wine, beer or other alcoholic beverages except when prescribed for medicinal purposes only.

The Durant bill, however, does not have a bone-dry character. It does not prohibit the sale of liquor for medicinal purposes.
