

WILL NOT SEIZE MONEY OF ALIENS

United States Not in That Sort of Game, Not Due to Treaty.

Washington, Feb. 8.—A formal statement giving assurances that the government has no intention of seizing bank deposits or other property belonging to any foreign subject even in the event of war was issued by the state department today with the approval of President Wilson.

The statement was prompted by the anxiety of German subjects, in some sections regarding savings deposits and by the many reports in circulation regarding the intention of the government concerning war bound vessels in American ports. It makes no specific reference to the Prussian-American treaty of 1828, which provides for the immunity of such property, which has been regarded as of doubtful validity, saying merely that the government "will in no circumstances take advantage of a state of war to take possession of property to which international understandings and the recognized law of the land give it no just claim."

The decision is understood to be in furtherance of President Wilson's determination that there shall be nothing in the conduct of the United States to warrant criticism, rather than indicative of any specific inclination to acknowledge the validity of disputed provisions of the old treaty.

Officials did not comment on a press dispatch from Berlin saying Ambassador Gerard had been asked to obtain a re-ratification of the treaty but previously they had indicated that such a suggestion would find no response here under present conditions.

FOREIGNERS PLEDGE LOYALTY TO NEW COUNTRY

German-Americans Stand Firm and True, Hexamer a Patriot.

Pittsburgh, Feb. 8.—Resolutions endorsing the action of President Wilson in severing diplomatic relations with Germany and pledging its loyalty to the United States were adopted by the German-American National Alliance at a meeting which continued its session here until early today.

It was also decided that in case of war to form regiments of German-Americans and to turn over to the American Red Cross funds which the alliance has been collecting for German war relief.

The meeting was attended by delegates from 28 states, hastily called by Dr. Charles J. Hexamer, the president. The alliance is said to have a membership of 3,000,000. After the session today Dr. Hexamer issued a statement in which he said: "Our delegates feel that we have been greatly misunderstood and unjustly criticized during the war, but if it comes to war with Germany our actions will not be susceptible to any further misunderstanding. We will back up our American government with our lives and our means."

NICHOLLS SCORES

CHICAGO EDITOR

Washington, Feb. 8.—Declaring that he hoped the editor of a Chicago newspaper would stay in that city where he belongs, "because I frankly tell you that if I meet him I will hold him personally responsible for this article," Congressman S. J. Nicholls of South Carolina today brought the house to white heat while replying to an attack made on the house military affairs committee, of which he is a member.

The trouble arose over the question as to whether the Hay national defense act passed at the last session of congress provided that not more than 50 per cent of the general staff should be in Washington.

To the general public there is not much in the article but as viewed by Mr. Nicholls and other members of the military committee, who felt that they had been unnecessarily criticized, it apparently means a great deal.

Continuing, Mr. Nicholls said:

"I want to know the name of the contemptible scoundrel who wrote that article. This article had not been called to my attention until it was read from the desk this morning, and I must confess that I was very much surprised that any paper in the United States would take occasion to speak of members of one of the most prominent committees of this house in any such terms. I know that it is not a time for us to be discussing politics and I also know that the Republican members voted for the proposition which was put in the bill.

"It has always been my experience and it has always been the custom in my part of the country that the man who reprints a paper is responsible for what goes in that paper.

The statement of the South Carolina congressman was the sensation of the day in the house. Mr. Nicholls said afterwards that he meant every word he had uttered on the floor and that should he ever meet the writer of the article he would deal with him as the thing is done at home—which means that some one is likely to get a licking before it is over.

SPAIN FIRM AND DIGNIFIED.

Can Not Accept the German View of War.

Madrid, Feb. 7.—The Spanish government's reply to Germany's warfare zone note is a firm and dignified protest against it. It declares that Germany's decision to close completely certain sea routes is outside the legal principles of international war. It adds that if Germany hopes to have Spain's help to avoid more loss of life it must be understood that Spain, while ready at the proper time to lend the initiative in support of the establishment of peace, can not accept the legality of exceptional methods of war.

STUCKY FOR GOVERNOR.

Other Plans of New Secret Farmers' Association.

Columbia, Feb. 8.—The ambitious plan of the new secret farmers association for the campaign of 1918 became known here today through information from one high in their councils. The plan is nothing less than to run Mr. W. A. Stuckey, of Bishopville, for governor next year and place legislative tickets in the field in each county. They may also nominate a full State ticket.

The program of the association calls for the extension of the association to each county and affiliation with the American Federation of Labor. They plan a union of farmers and laboring men and are in communication with the farmers of North Dakota, the State which was recently captured by a new farmers' movement, they having elected the governor, all the State officers, the lower house of the legislature and nearly a majority of the senate. The North Dakota movement is attracting nation-wide attention and has given impetus to the new farmers' secret association in South Carolina to "do likewise" next year.

Extending the organization of the new secret farmers' movement to each county and affiliation with the American Federation of Labor involves work and lots of it, but the leaders of the secret farmers union have gathered the funds necessary to extend the organization and are already at work. They are not making their plans public, but the information of their intentions came from one who started the movement and who is thoroughly conversant with its every detail.

Mr. Stuckey, who is the candidate of the secret farmers' association for Governor will not talk about the matter or even admit that he is their candidate. All he says is that he is in the race in 1918, regardless of who else runs. He has been one of the prominent leaders of the Blease faction and his determination to run is taken as indicative of a program which leaves the ex-governor out of the consideration for the future.

There has been talk in some quarters that the warehouse association may put out a State ticket for next year but this, it is said authoritatively, will not swerve the secret farmers' association from their intention. "We know our friends and will not be fooled by former leaders or would have been former leaders of former

factions," was the significant way in which one of the secret farmers leaders put the matter. The warehouse association meets on Monday night at 9 o'clock in the City Council chamber.

In addition to Mr. Stuckey, who heads the new farmers movement, Attorney General Thomas H. Peoples is a candidate for governor next year. Mr. Peoples is a Blease man who has not been defeated in the two years when the faction went down to defeat in the primaries and this is giving him a wonderful hold on those of his party who want to win.

There is some talk of other leaders of the late Blease faction going into the race for governor next year and everything indicates a new alignment on that side of the political house.—News and Courier.

SOUTH GOING AHEAD.

Gaining Supremacy in Cotton Manufacturing.

Washington, Feb. 7.—"Each month's report from the census bureau adds a chapter to the story of the passing of supremacy in cotton manufacturing to the South," said President Harrison of the Southern railway system, to-

day. "The report of the consumption of cotton in the mills of the United States during the month of December shows that consumption in Southern mills during the month amounted to 307,617 bales, an increase of 12,089 bales, or 4.09 per cent over December, 1915. Consumption in the mills of all other States during the month amounted to 228,970 bales, a decrease of 30,507 bales or 11.76 per cent below December 1915.

"In the five months' period ended December 31, consumption in Southern mills amounted to 1,583,581 bales, an increase of 207,218 bales, or 15.05 per cent over the corresponding period last year. Consumption in all other States during the period amounted to 1,180,381 bales, an increase of 23,104 bales, or only 2 per cent. During the month of December consumption in Southern mills exceeded that in the mills of all other State by 78,647 bales, or 34.35 per cent."
