LARQUE BANK EXAMINER; PUCKETTE PRIVATE SECRETARY

Chief Executive Saturday Night Announced Important Changes in Official Family—Office Assistant Newspaper Man.

Columbia, Feb. 25.—Governor Manning announced Saturday night that he had appointed his private secretary, Col. Oscar Kent La Roque, of Marion, State bank examiner to succeed Ivy M. Mauldin, of Pickens, who recently resigned to become vice-president of the Palmetto National bank of this city. Colonel La Roque will be succeeded as private secretary by John Elliott Puckette, of Columbia, formerly reporter for the Columbia State. Both appointments become effective March 1.

Colonel La Roque, who is 34 years of age, is a native of North Carolina, where he lived until 1905, when he moved to this state. His early years were spent at Kinston, N. C., where he began his business career in a bank of that city. After only two years' experience in his native town he was made cashier of a bank at Beaufort, N. C., when only 20 years of age. At that time he had the distinction of being the youngest bank cashier in the "Old North State". In 1905 he came to Columbia where he engaged in the insurance business, shortly after moving to Marion, where he continued the same pursuit. On September 1, 1915, he became private secretary to Governor Manning, which position he will hold until Wednesday. The salary of State bank examiner is \$3,000 per annum and he is allowed traveling expenses. His commission is for four years from date of appointment.

Since coming into the governor's office Colonel La Roque has made many friends throughout South Carolina and has been of invaluable assistance to Governor Manning in the conduct of the affairs of the State. Although quite a young man he had quite a large business and political experience, which

his friends think will be of inestimable benefit to him in the conduct of the large affairs of his new office.

John Elliott Puckette, who is only 26 years of age, was born and reared at Sewanee, Tenn., where he attended the Sewanee grammar school, from which he graduated. He received his collegiate education at the University of the South, Sewanee, from which he received his bachelor of arts degree in 1910. In September of that year he went to Birmingham, Ala., where he engaged in the insurance business, until he came to Columbia, October, 1912, to accept a position on the editorial staff of The State. In South Carolina newspaper work he soon gained a reputation of being an accurate narrator and careful and painstaking reporter. He reported the gubernatorial campaign in 1914, making every party in the State, sending to his paper well written and accurate accounts of the meetings. Last spring he again traversed the greater part of the Palmetto State, soliciting funds for the purpose of help paying a back-indebtedness of the University of the South, of which he was one of the leading alumni of the State.

When the president issued the call to the colors last summer, Mr. Puckette enlisted in the Charleston Light Dragoons, of which Capt. W. M. Manning, a son of the governor, was commanding officer. Mr. Puckette took the enlistment oath June 23, 1916. For the past few months on the border he acted as troop clerk and was promoted to private, first class. He was mustered out of the service at Charleston on February 17, 1917.

Although a native Tennessean, Mr. Puckette, on his maternal side, is descended from the South Carolina Elliotts as his middle name indicates.

The salary of private secretary to the governor pays \$1,500 per annum.

TO INVESTIGATE SALE OF PARKER COTTON MILLS

House Passes Bill of Representative Crews to Make Thorough Search Into Sale of Big Property.

Columbia, Feb. 19.—The house by an overwhelming vote this afternoon passed the Crews concurrent resolution instructing the attorney general to investigate the Parker Cotton Mills company and to institute criminal proceedings against the directors if it is found that they have been violating the laws of the state. The resolution alleges that the directors authorized speculating in cotton on Wall Street, and that the assets of the company have been depressed by "excessive" salaries to officers of the corporation.

Representative John W. Crews, of Columbia, in urging the passage of the resolution, denounced the manner in which the company has sold the "Hampton group" of mills located in this city and also charged that M. C. Branch, the President of the company, was a director of the Hanover National Bank in New York city, one of the largest creditors of the Parker company and said that end ought to be looked into. He said that the stockholders of the Hampton group had been given misleading information about the Hampton group of mills.

"I have enough information to satisfy me that there is something dead up the creek," said the Richland member, in charging that the directors of the Parker company had "gambled" in cotton futures, which he asserted was against the criminal law of this State and read the section of the Code bearing on this matter. "All who wish to unearth shady dealings will vote for this resolution," said Mr. Crews.

Mr. Hamblin, of Union, declared this was a matter for the courts and that the attorney general did not have time to be going into private affairs of corporations. "If there have been any violations of the criminal laws, then let judgments be brought by grand juries," declared the Union member, who moved to strike out the resolving words of the resolution. J. E. Davis, of Barnwell, also thought this was a matter for the courts, but Mr. Searson, of the same county, declared that "the machinations of these scheming financiers would, if brought into the limelight, put the efforts of modern financial transactions into the shade." He demanded that the probe go to the bottom and "turn on the light."

The house by an overwhelming vote refused to kill the resolution and, after adopting an amendment from Mr. Crews, cutting out any appropriation for the investigation, it being held that the attorney general had funds for this purpose already, the resolution was passed and sent to the senate.

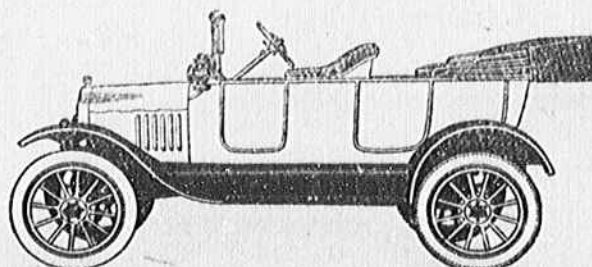
