PRICES OF COAL TO BE REDUCED BY JULY 1ST

Representatives to Fix Prices at Once Will Mean Much to the Public.

Washington, June 28.—Sweeping reductions in the price of bituminous coal at all mines east of the Mississippi river, ranging from one to five dollars a ton to the public with an additional cut of fifty cents for the government, were agreed upon today at conferences between the operators and government officials. The new prices become effective July 1.

Four hundred operators who gathered here yesterday at a call from Secretary Lane, pledged themselves to furnish their product by committees from each field.

Director Smith of the Geological survey estimated that the reduced prices would mean that the operators would get \$180,000,000 less annually for their output and that the saving to the government and the coal consuming public would be even greater.

In addition to placing prices upon coal at the mines it was announced that jobbers, brokers, retailers and commission men would be permitted to charge commissions of not more than 25 cents a ton and that no more than one commission should be charged. In other words the consumer will get his coal at the mine price plus transportation charges and 25 cents per ton.

The agreement does not effect anthracite and for the present general changes in the price of that product are contemplated, although the anthracite operators have been represented in the meetings.

In the final conference trade secrets between competitors, cost prices, and other confidential information was laid on the table and the government acting as judge, decided what would be the highest prices paid at mines, prices to go into effect on July 1, to stay in effect until investigations are made and other changes ordered.

Representatives from various states were asked to quote the minimum price at which they could furnish coal.

Must Keep Out of Spanish Pots, Says Decree.

Madrid, June 30.—King Alfonso has signed a decree dealing with submarines, with a view to avoiding a repetition of incidents such as that at Cadiz, where a German submarine took refuge and was later escorted out of the port by Spanish torpedo boats. The text follows:

Article 1. The submarines of all the belligerent powers are forbidden to navigate within Spanish territorial waters or to enter Spanish ports.

Article 2. All such submarines which enter the Spanish zone for whatever reason shall be interned until the end of the war.

Article 3. The submarines of neutral nations which enter Spanish territorial waters must navigate on the surface with their colors visibly displayed.
