RESTRICT ENEMY ALIEN WOMEN SOON May Take Census of German Women As Well As Men During Week of February 4.

Washington, Jan. 10.—Enemy alien restrictions probably will be extended soon to German women in the United States. Legislation to this end is being drafted, and congressional leaders have assured the department of justice that it will be enacted promptly.

If this is done before the week of February 4, when a nation wide registration of unaturalized Germans is to be made under supervision of the department of justice women probably will be included in the enemy

alien census. Regulations to govern the registration were sent today to police officials of cities, and postmasters of small towns, to whom the active administration of the registration has been entrusted. The rules differ from those already made public only in the fact that federal court districts, not county or local court districts, are to be considered units for gathering census returns from non-urban sections in which postmasters will take the registrations.

Of the hundreds of Germans who have been interned since the United States entered the war, only six have been paroled permanently, and ten given freedom for a time, it was disclosed today by John Lord O'Brien, special assistant to Attorney General Gregory in charge of war problems. The announcement was made in refutation of wide-spread reports that the government had released hundreds of dangerous alien enemies.

In the cases of men paroled temporarily, it is understood the action was taken in order that they might obtain valuable information to aid government agents in ferreting out plots or propaganda against the United States' war interests.

"So far as known, no person found to be a dangerous enemy alien once arrested has ever been permanently released," said Mr. O'Brien. "Of the entire number arrested from time to time as suspicious characters throughout the United States, less than a dozen have ever been the subject of subsequent complaints."

A number of communications recently received directing the attention of the attorney general to the fact that unfounded and false reports are being circulated in some parts of the country to the effect that undue leniency is being shown enemy aliens. Such reports are direct incitement to damage on the part of wrong-doers and cause serious hindrance in the work of apprehending alien enemies.

"Instead of leniency, vigorous severity has been shown in dealing with persons actually found by the attorney general to be dangerous to the welfare of the country. Confusion appears to have arisen due to the impression that an arrest in itself an internment; this is not so. Under the president's proclamation the department is authorized to apprehend and intern enemy aliens found to be dangerous or a menace to the safety of the country. In and around New York City men of this type arrested on suspicion are temporarily detained on Ellis Island, which is not an internment camp. In other parts of the country they are detained in jails or local prisons."

"If after investigation it is declared that the suspect is a dangerous enemy alien, within the meaning of the proclamation and he is delivered forthwith to the custody of the war department and immediately transferred to a war detention camp. On the other hand, aliens thus arrested on suspicion and not found to be dangerous to the country are not interned, but are customarily released upon parole required to give a bond for good conduct and report at short intervals to a person satisfactory to the department known as a supervisor."

GERMAN PRISONERS HELD BY RUSSIA

Not Going to Release Them Yet, Says Bolshevik. No Exchanges.

The probable exchange of prisoners between Russia and Germany has gone no farther than the exchange of invalids and civilians, according to Foreign Minister Trotsky. As a matter of fact the German war prisoners are not closely confined in Russia but are living in the small villages and allowed to do much as they please. Many of them do not care to return to Germany. It is believed in some quarters that Germany would like to have many of them stay so as to help circulate German ideas in Russia and to colonize the country as Germans have done in South America. The Bolsheviks have tried hard to inculcate their doctrines among the German prisoners, holding meetings and making speeches to them on universal brotherhood but the Germans do not seem to be much impressed according to a special dispatch from Petrograd. The correspondent attended one of these meetings, about 800 prisoners being present. The Czechs of Austria seemed to be impressed but he said the German prisoners maintained a stolid silence throughout.

1,539,506 SOLDIERS IN UNITED STATES ARMY

Secretary Baker Defends War Department's Preparations for Battle Against Germany Before Committee. Army Is Well Cared for and in Health.

Washington, Jan. 10.—Every phase of the war department's preparations for battle against Germany was outlined and defined by Secretary Baker today before the senate military committee. He answered those who have criticized the department during the committee's investigation with the assertion that no army as large as that ever had been raised, equipped or trained so quickly, and that never before had such provisions been made for the comfort and health of an army.

The secretary read an exhaustive prepared statement when he took the stand today. The questions began to fly from every side of the committee table, launching a cross-examination that was not concluded at adjournment tonight and probably will continue all day tomorrow.

Chairman Chamberlain and other committee members wanted to know particularly about delays in furnishing machine guns and rifles and much attention was devoted to the army's purchasing system. Mr. Baker mistakes and delays but declared admitted that there had been some that all fighting men in France were adequately equipped and armed and that all equipment would be. He took the stand and was not interrupted full responsibility for delay in approving a machine gun, holding that the value of the Browning gun now developed was worth it. He also said the superior weapon obtained by having the British Enfield rifle re-chambered for American ammunition compensated for the delay there.

More than 15,000,000 Americans are now under arms, Secretary Baker said, and an army of substantial size already is in France ready for active service.

Members of the committee were frank in their disapproval of the secret purchasing system of the department. They did not shake Mr. Baker's support of it, however. He insisted that it was essential to guard against publicity concerning plants engaged on war work.
