GERMAN SPY RAN STEAMER ON ROCKS

Government Agents Arrest Man Who Stood at Wheel of the Liner Spo. kane. How Hun Played Game.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 14.-Federal agents arrested here today a German who masquerading under the name of "William Swanson," stood at the wheel of the Alaska liner Spokane when she crashed onto the rocks off Idol Point, B. C., on the night of November 22, 1917, while bound from Southeastern Alaska for Scattle with 237 passengers.

"Swanson" was not a member of the Spokane's crew, it was said. He went aboard the ship when she left Alaska for Seattle, mingled with the crew and passed himself off as a quartermaster, the federal investigators explained. They said he was able to succeed in his deception as the Spokan on the voyage had a new set of deck officers, who were unfamiliar with the faces of the vessel's crew.

The Spokane was floated some time after she struck. No lives were lost n the accident.
