BOLSHEVYKI POWER SLOWLY WAVING

So Says American Reaching Stockholm. Jews Fear Trouble.

Stockholm, Feb. 17.—That the power of the Bolsheviki in Russia slowly is waning is the conclusion of an American who reached Stockholm today from Petrograd, where he had resided for 18 months. This man left Petrograd, February 7.

"So long as there were masses of soldiers in Petrograd and Moscow," said he, "the Bolsheviki's opponents have felt that any attempt to establish an ordered government was impossible. As a matter of fact, many of these soldiers are not Bolsheviki, but their mere presence was a deterrent. Now they are gradually departing for farms and villages and it will be impossible ever to recall them."

"This is especially true of Moscow, where the opponents of Nikolai Lenin and Leon Trotzky are beginning to pluck up courage. Another factor against the Bolsheviki is their campaign against the church. Probably a majority of the educated Russians favor separation of church and state, but do not like the idea of confiscation of church property by such people as those composing the present government."

"The Jews are growing uneasy over the symptoms of a recrudescence of anti-Jewish agitation. Anti-Semitism is deeply ingrained in large masses of the Russian Catholics, whose sentiments are further embittered by the fact that the present government, un-

der which the people have suffered much humiliation and hardships, is made up principally of Jews. A prominent Jew said to me last week: 'When the reaction comes they will take it out on us.'"

The American said that the principal grave situation with regard to food was in respect to bread, which contains straw and is almost uncutable. He said it was feared that the peace between Ukraine and the central powers would make still worse the food outlook.

Two weeks were occupied by the American in crossing Finland. There were large numbers of the Red Guards in Tampere, Kristinestad, he said, was full of White Guards, who were constantly drilling and seemed well disciplined and organized.

The White Guard leaders said they could easily clean up the country if they had arms and ammunition. The Germans would do all they could to assist them.

The American saw no indication of a real shortage in Northern Finland. He said he had looked to the bay and several members of the White Guard leaders were furnishing him with considerable stores of provisions, he added.

AMERICANS DISPLAY GOOD MARKSMANSHIP

Artillerymen Tear Up Underground Structure and Wipe Out Sniping Post of Enemy.

With the American Army in France, Feb. 17.—The American artillery has made more direct hits on important enemy works. Observers for some time had noted a large number of enemy workings at a particular place on a large underground structure. Early this morning the American gunners got the range and a stream of shells broke in on the position, hurling heavy timber and other material high in the air. The new sniping posts, where the snipers were using perfection were wiped out by American artillery fire.

General Pershing today completed his inspection of the American lines.

A Dozen Jobs to Finish Up and Be Done With.

6. Let's start a bank account—because it means safety, thrift, and a new sense of dignity.
7. Let's take out some fire insurance—because the average farmer is not able to rebuild a burned home without financially cramping himself for years, and insurance is just and equitable cooperation, whereas getting subscriptions from neighbors is not.
8. Let's provide enough raincoats, overshoes, overcoats, cloaks, and boots or leggings for every member of the family—because they cost less than doctor's bills and coffins.
9. Let's start now to make wood and water just as convenient as possible for the good wife—providing a woodhouse to keep fuel dry, and if we can't provide waterworks, then at least a nearby well with covered walkway to it.
10. Get some pure-bred poultry now and resolve that every animal

born on the farm henceforth shall have a pure-bred sire—because this increases pride and profits.

11. Build a good implement shed and provide sanitary and convenient privies—because absence of these advertises the farm-owner as

careless of cash, health and civilization. 12. Let's make friends with any neighbors with whom we have been at outs—submitting to arbitration rather than a lawsuit any matters about which we can't agree.—Progressive Farmer.

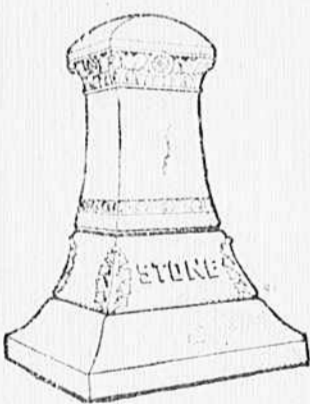
