

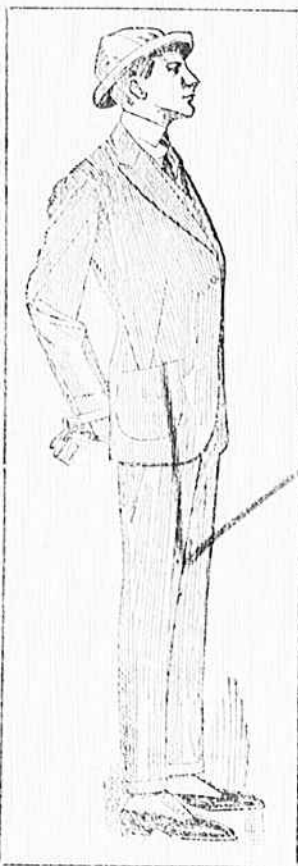
WATTS MILL NEWS.

AS TO LIQUOR PERMITS.

On and after the 10th day of March next permits will be issued on Mondays, Fridays and Saturdays.

To procure a permit the applicant must appear in person and file the usual affidavit, which must be accompanied by a physician's certificate to the following effect: "That the applicant has sickness in his family and needs alcoholic liquor for his (her) immediate family medicinal use."

The bare statement that applicant has sickness in his or her family, is not sufficient. Physician's certificate must state that alcoholic liquors are necessary in this particular case.

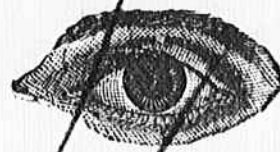

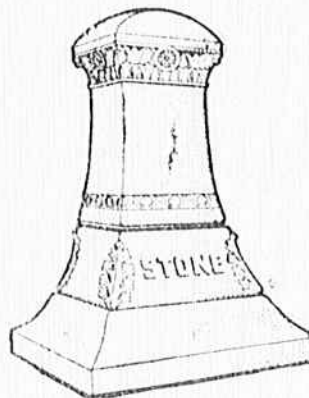
