

I. W. W. AGITATORS TO BE ROUNDED UP

Government Decides Upon Vigorous Policy for Suppression of Lawlessness. Plan is to Intern Them.

Washington, March 2.—A vigorous policy for the suppression of anarchists and all who advocate sabotage and other forms of lawlessness was announced today by Secretary Wilson in orders to immigration officials in the Northwest to proceed to arrest aliens guilty of spreading such doctrines. Even though they may not commit any overt act they will be detained and deported.

The Secretary's action was in answer to requests from employers and civic organizations of Seattle and other cities that the department undertake wholesale internment of Industrial Workers of the World, who were blamed for industrial unrest, particularly in the logging camps. Mr. Wilson held that membership in the I. W. W. organization was itself cause for arrest or deportation, but that alien industrial workers or other aliens who preach overthrow of the government by force, assassination, or who are in any other manner subject to deportation under the immigration laws should be taken into custody at once.

The department stands ready to support the round-up of anarchistic agitators by supplying funds to obtain additional quarters if the Seattle station proves inadequate for internment.

Orders for the suppression of radical propaganda by aliens are regarded by officials as the final step in the government's determination to put a stop to extremists who seek to interfere with the prosecution of the war from motives sincere or otherwise. Citizens of the United States who preach anarchy will be handled by the department of justice, which brought about the arrest of scores of I. W. W.'s in the nation-wide raids last year. Secretary Wilson's order was issued with a full personal knowledge of the situation in the Northwest. As chairman of the President's mediation commission, he investigated the unrest of the lumber camps and saw mills last fall.

AMERICA WILL AGREE TO ACTION BY JAPAN

Expected to Be One of Immediate Effects of Signing of Peace by Russia. President May Address Congress on Subject.

Washington, March 3.—One of the immediate effects of the signing of Germany's peace terms by the Russian Bolshevik representatives probably will be to bring to a quick conclusion negotiations among the allies and the United States over steps to be taken in Siberia to protect military stores and check any move the Teutons may make in that direction.

There still is every indication that the American government will join with the allies in agreeing to action by Japan alone, with an understanding as to the scope of any operations to be undertaken. So far there has been no announcement of an agreement, but even before the news that the Russians formally had accepted the German terms had come it was understood that the exchanges on the subject were about concluded.

President Wilson has been following the situation in Russia very closely, particularly owing to its close relation of the step proposed by Japan. There have been suggestions that he might appear before congress soon to make a statement on the subject, although no one confesses to know his plans.

U. S. AMMUNITION IS EQUAL TO ANY

Successful Development of Special Types of Aerial Warfare Announced. Include Armor Piercing and Incendiary Bullets and "Tracers."

Washington, March 3.—Successful development of special types of small arms for use in aerial warfare was announced today by the war department. These include armor-piercing cartridges, incendiary cartridges and "tracers."

Bullets able to pierce steel became necessary when, in the early months of the war, both sides began to equip the vital parts of airplanes with light armor. "Tracer cartridges", leaving a trail of smoke are used to enable the machine gun operator to ascertain whether his shots are correctly aimed and the incendiary bullets set fire to the contents of the enemy's fuel tank.

Recent tests, the announcement says, indicate that the United States has developed these types of special ammunition to a point fully equal to or surpassing anything used abroad.

SAYS LINE UP SPIES AND EXECUTE THEM

Senator Harding Declares that Bomb and Torch Men Should be Shot. End Soap Box Philosophy.

Baltimore, March 3.—A plea for a place "against the wall" for German spies was made here this afternoon by Senator Harding, of Ohio, in an address at a patriotic meeting under the auspices of the Maryland branch of the Council of National Defense. He also refuted the suggestion that capitalistic motives impel the United States and her allies.

"Among us are miserable spies whom Germany would soon dispose of," he said. "I honor Germany for it. The trouble is that we think too much of ballots and too little of bullet-works of liberty. In justice to these 100,000,000 American people there is but one place for the man with the bomb and the torch. That place is against the wall. We must be for America first."

"A lot of men in the country have said this is a capitalistic war. That is a lie. Capital was making ten times more before the war than it is making now. We are taxing capital. What are we doing for labor?"

"No government founded upon soap box philosophy ever endured. We don't want the government of chaotic Russia tried in the United States. Sometimes I think that soap box agitation is endangering this war."

BLACKMAILER SENTENCED.

Man Who Tried Game on Mayor Candler Goes to Gang.

Atlanta, Feb. 28.—J. W. Cook, a real estate salesman who was convicted yesterday, was sentenced to one year on the chaingang and a fine of one thousand dollars for conspiracy to blackmail Asa G. Candler, the millionaire mayor of Atlanta. He is still in jail today in default of bond. The hearing on appeal is set for March 16th. Conferences are being held today to decide whether Mrs. H. H. Hirsch, indicted jointly with Cook, shall go to trial tomorrow, as planned.

Solicitor General Boykin announced later that he would not try the Hirsch case this week. No date has been set for the trial.


