Letter From France.

Private John B. Cheek, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Cheek, of Princeton, has written the letter below to his mother, enclosing with it a photograph of himself, Henry Wood and several other Laurens boys. Private Cheek enlisted early in the war as a member of Co. D and was later transferred to the engineers. His letter was as follows:

On Active Service in France
Feb. 10, 1918.

Dear Mother:
As I have a few spare moments I will write you a few lines. The weather is very warm and I feel fine. The trees are budding very fast and it looks like spring and I hope it is.

We are still working hard and having a good time. The things are getting very funny, but it is not so bad as some people think. It sure takes a rough man to stand what is to do. You have to get to where you don't care for nothing, and we are just about to get to that place. Please subscribe for the county paper and send it to me. I have not received your box yet, but guess it will come before long. I received a box from Sister and sure did enjoy it. I will not have time to write often, but will write as often as possible. 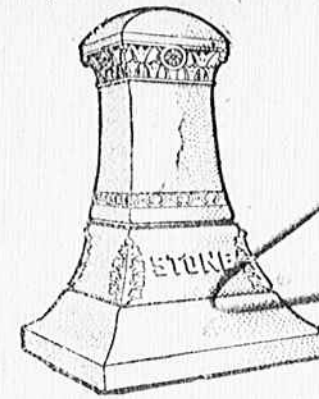

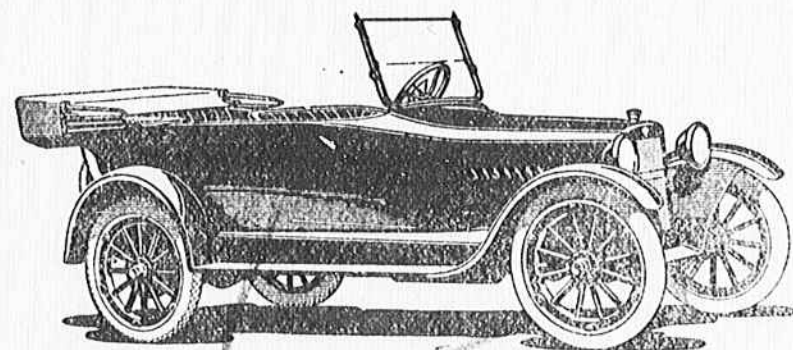
