SALE OF ALIEN PROPERTY.

Legislation Necessary to Check Ger-

Washington, March 7.-Legislation enabling the government to place in American hands permently great German commercial and industrial concerns in this country which have been instruments in spreading the grip of German kultur was favorably reported to the Senate today by the appropriations committee. It is in the form of an amendment to the pending urgent deficiency bill, empowering the alien property custodian to sell any enemy property taken over by his

The committee also approved another amendment giving the President authority recently asked for by him to acquire by purchase or title the great piers of the Hamberg-American and the North German Lloyd steamship lines at Hoboken, N. J.

In a statement today explaining the purpose of the new power sought, A Mitchell Palmer, the alien property custodian, said:

"Power under the law is restricted now to cases where it is necessary to sell in order to prevent waste and protect property. The promised amendments will largely extend this power and make it possible for the alien property custodian to convert into eash enemy interests in this country * * *

"There is no thought or purpose of changing the character of the ordinary investment in America of the enemy subjects residing in enemy territory. Such investments will continue at present, except when necessary to prevent waste or protect the property when sales may take place.

"If the amendments reported by the Senate appropriations committee shall become law the power of sale will only be exercised by the alien property custodian in cases similar to that of the steamship lines where the enemy ownership of great industrial and commercial concerns in the United States indicate a close affiliation Sunday. with the financial and politicals powers in the enemy country."


