Appointed Army Chaplain.

Rev. George E. Smith, of Cross Hill, has been appointed as chaplain in the army and will report for duty at Louisville, Ky., July 12. Notice of the appointment was received by Mr. Smith last week. He came before the local exemption board for physical examination with the view of meeting the requirements for admission to the work. Mr. Smith offered his services several months ago. He is past the draft age but he felt that he might contribute something to the cause in a capacity of chaplain and worker among the men in camp or overseas. Mr. Smith is pastor of the Baptist churches at Cross Hill, Mountville, Waterloo and Beavertown. He formerly held the pastorate of a group of churches in the Cross Anchor section of Spartanburg county.
