Regardless of how the election would have come out yesterday, supporters of the Laurens candidates in the senatorial and gubernatorial races would have had nothing to regret in casting their lots with them. Both of them conducted campaigns with which no one could find fault, unless it was that they were not aggressive enough. They discussed the issues of the day without rancor or bitterness, yet with force and energy so that they must have won the respect of their opponents and certainly hold a large following.

For mechanical reasons The Advertiser was forced to go to press on its editorial page last night before the returns were well in. However, at the early hour it appeared that both the Laurens candidates for state offices were destined to win in the first primary. Hon. N. B. Dial for the United States Senate and Hon. R. A. Cooper for Governor of the state. Laurens is proud of the distinction of having two such high officials elected on the same day from among its citizenship and we take the risk of congratulating them before the returns are complete, feeling that they are sure to win and that, after winning, they will reflect honor upon themselves and the city and county they come from.

Probably too much emphasis is laid on the prior claims of the common schools over the colleges. It may be true that the state and all states are niggardly in the support of the common schools. We believe they are and we know South Carolina is. That explains the difficulty of securing good teachers. But, in our hasty judgment we overlook the fact that the colleges must be kept far enough in advance to provide the teachers for the common schools. Efficient common school teachers cannot be made in the common schools. Higher training is needed and all those who attend college do not become teachers. We cannot afford to be stingy in providing funds for either, but we should not become so zealous in our advocacy of education that we lose sight of our sense of fairness and justice. We should attempt to give all classes of the people a fair deal.

CARLTON W. SAWYER DEAD.
Was Preparing for a Dove Hunt and While Clearing His Gun, It Accidentally Discharged.

Columbia, Aug. 23.—Comptroller General Carlton W. Sawyer was accidentally killed here this afternoon, when he was examining a gun preparatory to going dove hunting. Mr. Sawyer was in his room when the fatal accident occurred. Mr. Sawyer was at 1329 Senate street, the residence of Mrs. L. B. McGregor, where he had lived for the past twenty years.

J. W. Koon Appointed Game Warden.
Mr. J. W. Koon, formerly deputy sheriff and later rural policeman of the county, has been appointed as game warden by Gov. Manning to serve under the county warden, Mr. G. F. Little. Mr. Little's territory embraces all of Laurens county and parts of adjoining counties, so that he requires additional help to look after the entire territory.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS MEET HERE FRIDAY

Prof. R. T. Wilson, of Owings, is president of the association. Webb, State General Secretary, of Spartanburg, and Miss Milwee Davis, State Elementary Superintendent, with headquarters also at Spartanburg, will be present and assist in the convention work. Both are well known in this city and county, and will be heard with much interest.

A most cordial invitation is extended to the teachers and officers of the city schools to attend this meeting. Because of the fact that the County Conventions are usually held in the county churches a large number of the workers in Laurens have been unable to attend these meetings.
