WOMEN WILL REPLACE MEN IN MANY JOBS

More Man Power is Needed and Women Can Take Their Places. Work

Will be Started. Washington, Sept. 23.-Machinery designed to force out non essential imployment and muster women of the nation to take their places was put n motion today by 1,000 community abor boards reaching into every secion of the country.

The boards are acting under deailed instructions from the governacat working through the United States Employment Service.

Each board will soon publish lists of industries in its locality in which men should be replaced by women. The lists will be based on surveys of all industrial plants in each board's district. The surveys will be minute. Each job will be studied to determine whether a woman could fill

Publication of the lists is expected to cause employers to comply and substitute women as a result of the normal pressure thus exerted. Where moral pressure fails, stronger measures may be undertaken. The employment service, working through the war industries board has power to shut off he supply of raw materials from any

This move is a result of the enlarged irmy program under which 4,000,000 uen will be sent to Prance by next

It is expected to weed out of non essential employment every man in he nation. The corrollary is the probable induction of bundreds of thousands of women not only into non-essential war industries but into munition factories as well.

Officials say the number of women may run into millions.

The women are imperatively needed o insurè an adequate supply of material and munitions to the fighting men in France. Because of the nation-wide labor shortage, the munition rogram faces serious delay.

This is made plain in the instructions to local boards sent out by the employment service.

"To the extent that we fall behind in the supply of material we shal have o make up the deficit from the living bodies of our young men," reads the instructions. "This is not rhetoric, It s precise, cold military calculations."

"As soon as the facts are realized, Americans are going to cease carrying on busin essasus ual and swarm into war work."

The use of the term "non-essential employment" in the instructions to community boards has a special sig nificance. Although a man is working in a munition factory and even is mak ing shells he still may be classified as a "non-essential worker," This will occur when the community boards sur vey shows that the man's job can and should be filled by a woman.

The program then, really means the women of the nation are to be mus tered to help turn out the shells with which our soldiers will blast their pah oward Lerlin.

In making the surveys the boards will lay emphasis on the jobs and not on the industry as a whole.
