**RED CROSS NOTES.**

Mrs. W. D. Ferguson has received notice from Camp Sevier that on account of the limited number of socks fit for repair after being laundered, and the many calls for them by willing Red Cross women, no socks could be sent to Laurens, but that several thousand cotton and wool undershirts and drawers were on hand for repair. The Laurens Department of Woman's Work accordingly accepted 3,000 garments to be mended. The auxiliaries will be notified just as soon as they arrive, as work must be begun on them at once.

**"Uncle Sam" Makes Christmas Preparations.**  
 Plans are being perfected by the War Department, the postal authorities and the American Red Cross whereby the men in the American Expeditionary Forces will be provided with Christmas packages, though the fruit will be one parcel to each man. Coupons are being distributed by the army authorities to the men overseas to be forwarded to their relatives and friends, and no parcel will be received by the postoffice without this label which authorizes its shipment.

The contents of the packages will be supplied by the families, but the Red Cross will furnish standard cartons, as all packages must be of the same size and weight, and will inspect, wrap and deliver inspected parcels to the postal authorities.

The order for these cartons has already been placed, and they will be delivered the latter part of October in time to be distributed to chapters. No cartons will be given out until the labels arrive from abroad, and complete details will be sent to all Red Cross Chapters as soon as the final arrangements are completed by the war department and the post office.

**GASLESS SUNDAY SAVES GASOLINE**

**Sends Many More Barrels of Gasoline to France.**  
 New York, Sept. 28.—Since the first "gasless Sunday," ten cargo boats carrying 500,000 barrels of gasoline, which otherwise could not have been shipped, have been sent to France from the United States, declared Mark L. Requa, director of the oil division of the federal fuel administration, in an address here tonight before hundreds of manufacturers and engineers pledged to conserve coal and fuel oil to help win the war.

"Not less than 25,000,000 barrels of crude oil more than the United States consumed last year must be produced this year, a total of 365,000,000 barrels, or approximately 70 cent cent. of the world's entire output," Mr. Requa said.

"Every new destroyer will add to this amount; every airplane will use 30 gallons of gasoline per hour; every tank, motor truck and ambulance must have the products of petroleum and you must help in making these products available."

Government inspectors, it was said, will visit all plants at intervals to ascertain how efficiently coal and oil are being used. Plants will be classified as follows:

"Excellent, 90 to 100 per cent; good, 80 to 90; fair, 70 to 80; poor, 60 to 70. Where inefficiency and waste of fuel is observed negligent plants, it was announced, will be penalized by the priorities board by being permitted to obtain only as much fuel as they demonstrate they use scientifically.

**NOW THINKS FIGHT FOR FARMERS WON**

Senator E. D. Smith Considers Cotton Price Fixing Proposition Laid on Shelf.  
 Washington, Sept. 28.—Commenting on the statement published today of Thomas Walker Page and Charles J. Brand representatives of the government who will have charge of the distribution of raw cotton, who declared that it is not the purpose to fix prices, Senator E. D. Smith of South Carolina, who has consistently opposed price fixing and never was convinced that it would be attempted, furnished the following statement for publication:  
 "The statement issued by Messrs. Page and Brand expresses the conclusion of all the numerous conferences and interviews on the subject.  
 "The representatives of the farmers from every cotton growing State held numerous meetings in my office during the past week and with a wonderful conservatism and grasp of the subject formulated their ideas and then laid them before the administration, with the result as announced today by Messrs. Page and Brand.  
 "I, as chairman of the senate committee, conferred with them, the president and the board appointed by the president and from first to last emphasized the disastrous result that would follow arbitrary price fixing, especially with regard to the present crop.  
 "After weeks of nerve racking, strenuous work the cotton situation seems to be satisfactorily adjusted."  
 Senator Smith has been invited by President W. S. Cullitt of the University of South Carolina to make a Liberty Loan address in Columbia Tuesday, but stated today that his acceptance depended upon the status of the suffrage amendment now under debate in the senate. He feels that he should have his vote recorded on such an important measure.

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**AVIATOR KILLED AT COLUMBIA.**

**Lt. Louis K. Godman Loses Life When Crashed to Earth During Liberty Loan Parade.**  
 Columbia, S. C., Sept. 28.—Lieutenant Louis K. Godman, an aviator from Emerson Field, lost his life this afternoon when the machine in which he was bombarding Columbia with appeals to purchase Liberty Bonds, crashed to earth in an alley just off Main Street.  
 Lieut. Roy Thomas, aerial observer was painfully, though not seriously, injured in the fall.  
 Major Norman W. Peck, commander of the aeronautical troops at Camp Jackson, said tonight that, insofar as could be detected, engine trouble was not the cause of the tragedy. His own conjecture was that the accident was caused by flying too low, which, he emphasized, was strictly against orders.

Twelve or fifteen minutes were consumed in extricating the two young men from the tangled wreckage. Both were rushed to a hospital, where Lieutenant Godman expired on the operating table a few minutes later. Lieutenant Thomas was removed to the base hospital later in the afternoon.

Lieutenant Godman was a native of California, his mother residing at Berkeley Hills, near Los Angeles. The body will be taken to Los Angeles for interment. He was 25 years of age, and is survived by his widow and a child about 4 years old.

Mrs. Godman occupied a seat on the reviewing stand two blocks from the place where the machine fell. Godman was a daring pilot and has performed many remarkable feats over the aviation field at the entertainment.

The accident occurred while a parade of troops from Camp Jackson was passing through Columbia in celebration of the opening of the Fourth Liberty Loan drive.
