**WISS HIGH PRAISE**

Gen. Sir Henry Rawlinson Adds Word. South Carolina Lads.  
With Anglo-American Forces on the Valenciennes Front, Oct. 12.—Gen. Sir Henry Rawlinson, commanding the British Fourth Army, with which an American division is operating, has sent to the general commanding the division, comprising troops from Tennessee and the Carolinas, the following telegram:

"On this occasion I desire to convey to you and all the members of the staff, as well as all other ranks of the divisions, my heartiest congratulations on your victory. The gallantry of your infantry and the precision with which the staff arrangements worked fill me with admiration and it has given me great pleasure to report your unqualified success to Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig."

The Thirtieth division, composed of North Carolina and South Carolina and Tennessee National Guardsmen, has been mentioned frequently of late in British official statements and dispatches from the front as having taken a prominent part in the fighting in the Valenciennes area. This division captured St. Souplet, Premont and several other towns, and on one occasion Associated Press dispatches from the British front said the Germans "ran away like rabbits" before the Thirtieth. The division trained at Camp Sevier, Greenville, S. C.

**NO LIST OF MISSING FROM LOST OTRANTO**

Units Sailing Not Given Out Until Information Comes as to Ship Taken.

Washington, Oct. 12.—A brief cablegram containing only the bare confirmation of the sinking in the North Channel last Sunday of the British steamer Otranto, laden with American troops was the only official news of the disaster reaching the war department today. Loss of the vessel, the message stated, followed a collision with another ship in the same convoy.

The cablegram gave no estimate of the number of soldiers who are missing.

American troops on the British transport Otranto, sunk in a collision last Sunday in the North Channel, numbered 690, the war department tonight announced. The contingent consisted of the two companies of replacement troops and two companies of casualties.

In the absence of specific information as to what units had been assigned to the Otranto, at the port of embarkation, General March, chief of staff, declined to make public the units which had sailed. Publication of his list it was said would bring needless anxiety to relatives of the men who were on the other ships of the convoy and who are now safely landed.
