While nowhere in the note does the president join openly with the Entente tatesmen in the demand that "the chief criminals" must be delivered up for trial, the president's confidants point out that he plainly subscribes to the doctrine that the guilt of bring-

ing on the world war is personal. It will be noted that the president completely rejects the German suggestion for a mixed commission to arrange an evacuation and reminds the militarists that they will accept the terms laid down by Marshal Foch and the associated commanders; that they will have no part in framing them.
