

A 10 GPART IN THE WAR.

In reading an article in Colfler's it occurred to us that South Carolina troops look part in three of the most important nillitary movements of the campaign which brought about the German survender. The 42nd Division, made up from troops of many states, including South Carolina and Laurens itseif, was in Gourard's offensive of July 18th north of Chateau-Thierry when the Germans were first started on their retreat and barely escaped from the pocket between Soissons and Rheims. The victory of the Americans and allied armies here restilted not only in a gain of territory, but a strengthening of the morale of the entire allied world.

South Carolina troops were not given conspicuous places of hovor again until later in the summer and the 93rd Division-in which we South Carolina negro troops, commanded by white officers, Capt. Richey, Lieut. Lake, deceased, Lieut, J. C. Todd and others-were charged with clearing of the Argonne Forest and loosening of the grip of the Germans on the Meuse River. The Argonne Forest was a seething nest of machine guns and artillery, the fighting here being among the stubbornest of the war. Here Lieut. Lake and many other South Carolinians fell, a story of one battle having been graphically told by Capt. Richey in The Advertiser several

weeks ago. This was a strategic sector, because all of the German lines north hinged on it. The 93rd pushed steadily forward in the face of deadly fire and ultimately with other divisions forced the Germans out.

While the 93rd was putting up its valiant fight the 30th was being groomed for the great attack on the Hindenburg line, and on Sept 25th with the 27th New York Division, began the attack which resulted, Oct. 9th. in the breach of the German line a Cambrai.

Thus we see that South Carolina troops, among them our own Laurens boys, had a part and a big part, in the three vital movements of the campaign: the first counter-offensive between Chateau-Thierry and Soissons, the breaking of the Hun's grip on the Meuse, and the breach of the German line at Cambrai.


