NOTICE

of the COUNTY TREASURER

The Books of the County Treasurer will be open for the collection of State, County and Commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1918, at the Treasurer's office from October 15th to December 31st, 1918. After December 31st one per cent will be added. After January 31st, two per cent will be added, and after February 28th, seven per cent will be added till the 15th day of March, 1919, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several townships in which the property is located. This is important, as additional cost and penalty may be attached.

All able-bodied male citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years of age are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00, except old soldiers, who are exempt at 50 years of age. Commutation Road Tax \$1.50 in lieu of road duty. All men now in military service are exempt from road tax.

GINNING FIGURES GIVEN FOR COTTON

Total Placed at Eight Million Six Hundred and Eighty-One Thousand Bales.

Washington, Nov. 21.—Cotton ginned prior to November 14 amounted to 8,681,005 running bales, including 127,812 round bales, 6,873 bales of American, Egyptian and 24,145 bales of sea island, the census bureau announced today.

To that date last year ginnings were 8,571,115 running bales, including 157,719 round bales and 68,229 bales of sea island.

Ginning by States: Alabama, 620,617; Arizona, 13,226; Arkansas, 629,993; California, 25,913; Florida, 19,627; Georgia, 1,626,944; Louisiana, 109,378; Mississippi, 787,650; Missouri, 33,429; North Carolina, 527,381; Oklahoma, 435,307; South Carolina, 1,099,329; Tennessee, 189,641; Texas, 2,250,986; Virginia, 10,468. All other States, 2,119. Sea island by States: Florida, 8,100; Georgia, 13,904; South Carolina, 2,132.
