

License Fees for Hawkers and Peddlers in Laurens County, S. C.

Pursuant to an Act of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, therefor providing:

Be it resolved by the County Board of Commissioners of Laurens County, South Carolina, in regular annual meeting assembled:

That the License Fees to be paid by hawkers and peddlers doing business within the said County for and during the year A. D. 1919, be and the same are hereby fixed in the following amounts, to wit:

For foot peddlers of goods, wares and merchandise the sum of Fifteen Dollars.

For peddlers of goods, wares and merchandise in two horse wagon, or truck, Fifty Dollars.

For peddlers of goods, wares and merchandise in one horse wagon, Thirty Dollars.

Peddlers of stoves or ranges shall pay the sum of Seventy-Five Dollars for the first wagon or truck, and for each additional wagon or truck operated by the same firm the sum of Fifty Dollars.

Peddlers of clocks shall pay the sum of Fifty Dollars for the first wagon or truck operated, and Thirty Dollars for each additional wagon or truck operated by the same firm.

Peddlers of lightning rods shall pay the sum of Fifty Dollars for the first wagon or truck, and Thirty-Five Dollars for each additional wagon or truck operated by the same firm.

Peddlers of spectacles shall pay the sum of Twenty Dollars.

Peddlers of sewing machines shall pay the sum of Fifty Dollars for the first wagon or truck, and Thirty Dollars for each additional wagon, or truck, operated by the same firm.

Peddlers of pianos or organs shall pay the sum of One Hundred and Thirty-Five Dollars for each and every wagon or truck operated.

All licenses to be issued by the Clerk of Court of said County and to be of force and effect until the 31st day of December A. D. 1919, as provided by law.

Provided, That all licenses issued after the thirtieth day of June shall be for two-thirds of the above named rates.

Done and ratified in regular annual meeting at Laurens Court House, S. C., on the 9th day of January A. D. 1919.

PEACE CONFERENCE BRINGS FIRST STORM

Question of Secret or Open Session Involved. Agreement Reached to Issue Statement.

Paris, Jan. 15.—The question of whether the peace conference is to be secret or wholly open to the eyes and ears of the world, the settlement of which has been long awaited, was brought to a focus today, when it was announced that an agreement had been made to confine the information given the public to a daily official communiqué and that a gentleman's agreement prevailed among the delegates not to discuss or in any way give information of the meeting in the foreign office.

No written official announcement of this purpose was issued, but word was passed out to the effect, and it was followed by an explosion of protests which quite drowned out the doings of the peace commissioners.

The understanding is that the American and British delegates opposed this decision but the French, Italians, and Japanese voting together prevailed.

The British newspaper correspondents immediately joined in a memorial of protest, which they put before Premier Lloyd George. The American newspaper correspondents united in what is virtually a round robin to President Wilson in which they protested in measured terms against the decision and reminded the president that one of his 11 points specifies "open covenants of peace openly arrived at."

The memorial was before the president tonight and there is every reason to believe that such a storm has been raised that will force the question before the meeting again before the actual session of peace conference begins Saturday morning.

The question of whether the meetings are to be open or closed has been smoldering for several days. It is associated with conditions which have surrounded the lack of method in making public what has actually been going on in conference for the past month. The American newspaper correspondents, of whom there are about 100 here to report the peace proceedings, have been received in daily audience by the American commissioners under the stipulated conditions that what was developed was solely for their guidance and not to be reported as bearing the stamp of authority or coming from the mission.

The president himself has rarely seen any of the American correspondents and the newspaper men who have expressed themselves at a meeting of the organization they have formed as considering themselves trustees obligated to inform public opinion at home of the moves which are being made here in Paris, have been chaffing at what they have characterized as being kept out of touch with the fountain heads of official information having been confined to information disseminated by an official publicity agent. Meanwhile the French newspapers and the British newspapers having Paris editions have been appearing each day with inside information of the conferences and in some cases have actually quoted American officials in a manner from which the American correspondents were requested to refrain.

Time for Cleaning Streams in Laurens County, S. C.

State of South Carolina, County of Laurens.

Pursuant to an Act of the General Assembly of South Carolina therefor providing:

Be it resolved, by the County Board of Commissioners of Laurens County, in the State aforesaid,

That the following periods be and the same are hereby fixed for the cleaning of streams within said county for and during the year A. D. 1919 to wit:

That all streams shall be cleaned out as required by law during the period beginning the first day of February, and ending the last day of March; and that they shall again be cleaned during the period beginning the fifteenth day of July and ending the thirty-first day of August.

All land owners and persons in charge of lands are hereby notified and required to clean their streams within the above named periods.
