of the
COUNTY TREASURER

The Books of the County Treasurer will be open for the collection of State, County and Commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1918, at the Treasurer's office from October 15th to December 31st, 1918. After December 31st one per cent will be added. After January 31st, two per cent will be added, and after February 28th, seven per cent will be added till the 15th day of March, 1919, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several townships in which the property is located. This is important, as additional cost and penalty may be attached.

All able-bodied male citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years of age are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00, except old soldiers, who are exempt at 50 years of age. Commutation Road Tax \$1.50 in lieu of road duty. All men now in military service are exempt from road tax.

Senator Smith Advises Holding of Cotton and Severe Cut in Acreage for Year.

Washington, Jan. 27.—Senator E. D. Smith of South Carolina tonight issued the following statement on the cotton situation:

"The past embargo on cotton to neutral countries, the embargo to enemy countries, the demoralization in shipping and in shipping rates, the conditions necessarily attendant upon the transition from war to peace, the pending peace negotiations—all these are elements being used by the bears to depress the market. The fact remains that the world needs every bale of American cotton and more and will take it at the price we are standing for and higher if we will just be patient and hold what we have and cut the acreage, cut it severely. Every patriotic business man is our friend.

"I am doing all I can with the aid of our friends in the senate and house to get relief along the lines of shipping and the embargo. I hope for relief along these lines. Success is ours if we hold fast."

License Fees for Hawkers and Peddlers in Laurens County, S. C.

Pursuant to an Act of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, therefor providing:

Be it resolved by the County Board of Commissioners of Laurens County,

South Carolina, in regular annual meeting assembled:

That the License Fees to be paid by hawkers and peddlers doing business within the said County for and during the year A. D. 1919, be and the same are hereby fixed in the following amounts, to wit:

For foot peddlers of goods, wares and merchandise the sum of Fifteen Dollars.

For peddlers of goods, wares and merchandise in two horse wagon, or truck, Fifty Dollars.

For peddlers of goods, wares and merchandise in one horse wagon, Thirty Dollars.

Peddlers of stoves or ranges shall pay the sum of Seventy-Five Dollars for the first wagon or truck, and for each additional wagon or truck operated by the same firm the sum of Fifty Dollars.

Peddlers of clocks shall pay the sum of Fifty Dollars for the first wagon or truck operated, and Thirty Dollars for each additional wagon or truck operated by the same firm.

Peddlers or lightning rods shall pay the sum of Fifty Dollars for the first wagon or truck, and Thirty-Five Dollars for each additional wagon or truck operated by the same firm.

Peddlers of spectacles shall pay the sum of Twenty Dollars.

Peddlers of sewing machines shall pay the sum of Fifty Dollars for the first wagon or truck, and Thirty Dollars for each additional wagon or truck operated by the same firm.

Peddlers of pianos or organs shall pay the sum of One Hundred and Thirty-Five Dollars for each and every wagon or truck operated.

All licenses to be issued by the Clerk of Court of said County and to be of force and effect until the 31st day of December A. D. 1919, as provided by law.

Provided, That all licenses issued after the thirtieth day of June shall be for two-thirds of the above named rates.

Done and ratified in regular annual meeting at Laurens Court House, S. C. this the 9th day of January A. D. 1919.
