WOMEN FIGHT FOR JOBS MEN WANT

Case of Women Conductors Discharged at Cleveland Because Men Demanded It Before War Labor Board.

Washington, March 13.—Arguments in the appeal from the recommendation of the national war labor board that women conductors at Cleveland Ohio, be discharged to satisfy demands of striking male employees were heard today by the board. The case was taken under advisement and a decision is expected within two weeks.

Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, honorary president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association; Frank P. Walsh, former joint chairman of the board, and Miss Mary Van Kleeck, director of the woman industry service of the labor department, were among those appearing in behalf of the discharged women workers, while James H. Vahey, attorney for the International Amalgamated Association of Electric and Street Railway Employees, opposed the appeal.

Dr. Shaw declared that during the war women in all parts of the country had responded nobly to the nation's call for workers, but that now that the acute need for workers had passed, there was a tendency to "get rid of" the women.

"Men employes demand it" said Dr. Shaw, "and because they are organized they have power to enforce their demands. The worst of it is that many of the men so employed were never in the military service, but had left to enter "safe employment."

Dr. Shaw insisted that the basic right of women to do any kind of work they were capable of performing should be established and that men should not be allowed to say that women should not be employed.

Mr. Wash, who appeared as counsel for the women employes, said the board should declare that women were legally entitled to the same right in industry as men. The women conductors of Cleveland were unjustly discharged, he said and should be reinstated.

Miss Van Kleeck told the board that women's claim of freedom to choose occupations was the greatest labor issue before the country and that it should be solved favorably to allow women to contribute their best energies in peace as they did in war.

Mr. Vahey argued that the board was not legally empowered to order the re-employment of the women conductors, since its jurisdiction extended only to cases where labor disputes between employes and employers threatened to result in a strike. He said the women knew when they were employed that they would be retained only for the period of the war.

BRITISH DECORATE BRAVE CAROLINIANS

Washington, Marsh 13—Sixty-six American Army medical officers and men have been decorated by the British government for bravery and distinguished service in the war, Surgeon General Ireland was advised today by the British war office.

Major Emanuel Goldstein, of New York city, and Capt. George P. O'Malley, of Cleveland, were made honorary companions of the distinguished service order, and 49 captains and first lieutenants were awarded the military cross. The distinguished conduct medal and military medal of Great Britain was conferred upon 15 enlisted men.

The officers awarded the military cross include Lieuts. Louis W. Deprez, Memphis, Tenn.; Roy A. Douglass, A. Nashville, Tenn.; Lawrence B. Farrier, Mobile, Ala.; Roy G. Giles, Belton, Texas; Allen G. Heard, Galveston, Texas; William G. Millholland, New Orleans; Daniels J. Murphy, New Orleans; Edward L. Patterson, Barnwell, S. C. Angus J. Smith, Greenville, Fla.; Fred Oscar Stone, Maynordville, Tenn.; and Roy L. Vineyard, Amarillo, Texas.

The bar to the military cross was awarded to three lieutenants, one of whom is Lawrence B. Farrier, of Mobile, Ala.

Enlisted men receiving the distinguished conduct medals included James K. Falsom, 118th Infantry.

Men receiving the military medal included William H. Coble, ambulance company, 118; William J. Evans, Dillon, S. C. Edward D. Jones, ambulance company 118; William Franklin Jones Abbeville, S. C.; Herman W. Kenner, ambulance company 118; Charles B. Logan, headquarters 105th sanitary train; Donald Mackey, 102nd sanitary train; Harold P. Malley, sanitary detachment 107th Infantry; Usher Mannheim, 102nd sanitary train; Clyde E. Parazine, field hospital No. 118; Cecil Trammel, ambulance company 118.

Most of the units mentioned are parts of the 30th Division.

Meat: Russia and the Allies

Russia crumbled away and failed the Allies largely through lack of food, according to an American eyewitness.

With plentiful reserves and resources virtually untouched, her people starved at home and at the front because there was no adequate organization to place food where it was needed.

Animals on the hoof were shipped thousands of miles to the various fronts, wasting transportation facilities required for other purposes. They arrived shrunken and emaciated, to be killed and dressed amidst filth and confusion behind the lines. Half of those brought from Siberia, it is said, perished on the way; many more were unfit for food.

On the other hand, the American packers turned live stock into meat in large sanitary plants located in the producing sections, and shipped the product under refrigeration so that it reached the trenches in France in perfect condition, without waste.
