FORMER EMPEROR TO FACE ACCUSERS

Council of Four Decides on Trial of Hohenzollern. Huge Sum From Huns.

Paris, April 9.—The responsibility of the German emperor for the war and the means of bringing him to trial by one of the allied governments, probably Belgium, have been definitely determined upon by the council of four. This follows the definite decision on the terms of reparation for war damages, whereby \$5,000,000,000 must be paid within the next two years, and an international commission assess the remaining damage for a period of 30 years, beginning May 1, 1921.

Thus two of the great obstacles which stood in the path of the rapid attainment of peace have been removed within the last 24 hours, and the period of extreme tension over the inaction and the failure to secure tangible results is succeeded by revived confidence over the great advance made towards a permanent settlement. How far these results are due to the intimations conveyed to the summoning to France of the United States transport, George Washington by President Wilson is only conjectural, but it is at least a coincidence that the main difficulties began to dissolve from the time that this decision became known.

The exact nature of these difficulties are not disclosed. Friends of the president maintain that they were largely of a minor character, not involving large principles, though the president's adherence to his "14 points" as the rigid limitation of the scope of action appears to have run all through the deliberations during the tense period of the last few days.

While the tension has been greatly reduced, it is not entirely removed, as much depends on the continuation of progress with respect to the remaining obstacles, notably the Sarre Valley, the Rhine frontier, the Adriatic issue and a number of lesser issues which are still short of final agreement.

The agreement on responsibilities for the war is understood to have been a compromise between divided reports presented by the commission of which Secretary Lansing is chairman. There was a practical agreement on the general responsibility of the German emperor for bringing on the war, but division occurred on whether it was feasible to bring him to justice before an international tribunal.

The French and British view favored a tribunal, but the American view, it is understood, favored moral indictment without recourse to prosecution, owing to the lack of an international law as a basis for trial before an international court.

Belgium, on which the war fell first and heaviest, is reported to have taken a view much similar to that of the United States, while Japan and Italy were partially in accord with the American view.

It was owing to these divergent viewpoints that the council devised a new plan, whereby one of the allied nations, probably Belgium, would initiate prosecution against the former emperor and others responsible for the breach of treaties, the invasion of territory and the destruction directed his attention from his pots and pans and their contents.

The citation reads as follows:

"Cook Ira S. Holden (No. 1,910,598), Company K, Three-Hundred and Twenty-eighth Infantry, Eighty-second Division. During the severe fighting in the vicinity of Sommerance, France, October 16-31, 1918, Cook Holden demonstrated his great bravery and devotion to duty in continuing to work day and night in operating his kitchen many times under heavy fire, after three other kitchens in his battalion had been destroyed by enemy fire. Cook Holden managed to make up the deficiency by operating his own kitchen to his fullest capacity and by his fine work did much to maintain the morals of our soldiers."

RELIEF IN SIGHT FOR COTTON SEED OWNERS

Cotton Association Announces that There is a Marked Improvement in Cotton Seed Situation.

Columbia, April 12.—There has been a marked improvement in the cotton seed situation, according to a statement issued today by the South Carolina Cotton Association, which has been working on the seed situation for some time. The statement urges the farmers not to make use of their seed for fertilizer purposes as the mills will make direct purchases.

The statement issued by the association follows in full:

"The South Carolina Cotton Association has had up the question of the cotton seed situation for quite some time. They have been trying to get relief for the seed situation through every know source and are very much gratified to inform the public that the seed situation is being relieved to a marked extent. The Federal Reserve Board has rendered every assistance possible in bringing relief to the seed situation. The Federal Reserve Board has backed up the movement with the United States Food Administration and the Division of Collateral Commodities of the United States Food Administration in every way possible.

"While some oil has moved, still the mills have been badly blocked. Information now brings to light the fact that orders are being issued to mills to buy seed and the situation be relieved as fast as possible.

"Farmers are urged not to use their seed for fertilizer purposes, as the mills will make direct purchases. The proposition to store seed and the proposition to sell seed and accept a certain amount of hulls for the same are not in line with the straight out purchase of cotton seed which will certainly be made by the mills. This should be a great relief to the farmers as they have already been caused tremendous loss on account of not being able to dispose of their seed."

OCEAN BE STAGED

Australian and British Aviators Impatiently Await Better Weather to Start. Hawker Prevented Again From Starting.

St. Johns, N. F., April 12.—Dense fog and drizzling rain today forced Harry G. Hawker, Australian aviator, again to postpone his attempt to fly across the Atlantic in quest of fame and the \$50,000 prize offered by the London Daily Mail.

Yesterday a blustery southeaster made a "hop-off" impossible.

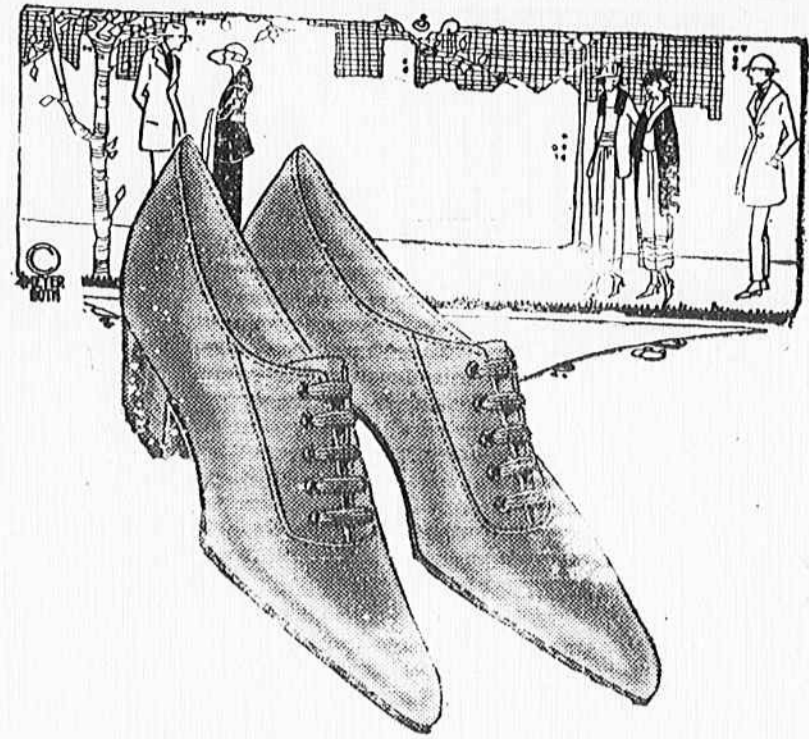
Hawker plans to begin his adventure at the first signs of favorable wind and weather, but mariners wise in the lore of fog and rain said tonight it might be a week before the misty curtains lifted as thick weather is to be expected at this season.

Meanwhile the Trans-Atlantic is developing rapidly a real race. Encouraged by the delays encountered by Hawker, Captain E. P. Raynham, British aviator, is rushing the work of assembling his Martinsyde biplane which he hopes to have ready in time to take the air at least as soon as Hawker's Sopwith machine "hops-off".

As the rivalry between the two camps increase there are indications that Hawker and Commander MacKenzie Grieve, R. N., his navigator, are ready to sacrifice every possible safeguard to the sporting desire of "getting the jump on the other fellow."

Despite rains over night continuing into this morning, Hawker prepared to begin the flight as soon as the fog lifted measurably. Scowling at the murky clouds being blown over the harbor on light winds, he ordered his plane made ready for flight while Commander Grieve sat judge on weather reports which came by telegraph and radio from along the coast and far out at sea. After several postponements today's plans were finally abandoned when Grieve decided that the weather with the hazards which ordinarily must be encountered was too inauspicious for the attempt.
