Griffith Romance Well Concealed.

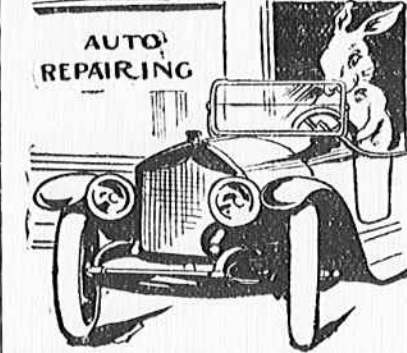
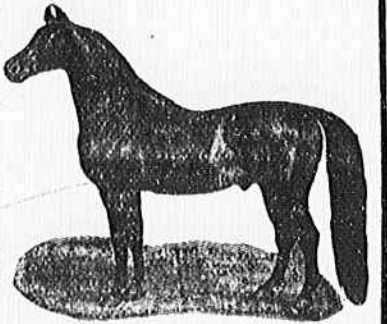

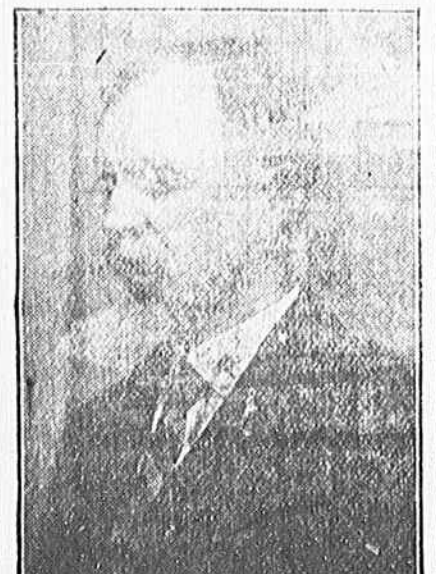
