**BURLESON AGAIN ON "WAR PATH"**

Postmaster General Reiterates Charges that Criticisms of His Administrations are Selfishly Designed.

Washington, April 25.—Postmaster General Burleson tonight continued his attacks against what he recently termed an organized effort to destroy him, by issuing a statement reiterating charges that criticisms of his administration were not designed to work improvements in the postal and wire service, but to obtain the repeal of the zone system or rates on second class mail matter. The Postmaster General said the issue arising from the criticisms presented a test which he welcomed.

"The news reaches the postmaster general this morning," says Mr. Burleson, in his statement, "that Mr. Burleson's methods as applied to the postal and wire service will be the subject matter of discussion today by the American Newspaper Publishers' Association."

"While this association is putting in the entire day by talking about Mr. Burleson and his methods, the thoughts of certain selfish members thereof during that time will not be on Mr. Burleson's methods or on desired improvements in the postal and wire service, but on their share of the \$72,000,000 they have been enjoying as an annual postal subsidy for many years, and as to how they may recover the part of which they were deprived by congressional action and how to remove the danger of losing more of it. There may be little said by them about this legalized graft, but it will be uppermost in their minds just the same."

"It is now insisted that this issue be not obscured to deceive the American people. The real issue is whether certain newspapers and magazines shall continue to filch from the postal revenue \$72,000,000 each year and impose that burden upon other users of the mail. This presents a test. I welcome it."

"It is noted that Mr. C. J. Post has promptly identified himself as the chief lobbyist of this coterie of selfish publishers to whom I referred in a recent statement. The others to whom I referred in that statement will be at this meeting. They are invited to disclose their identity and to repeat what they said to me."

"Mr. Post actually developed hysteria about 'Prussianism and vicious one-man censorship established in the postoffice.' The basis for this panic is as infamous a falsehood as was ever published, to wit, the alleged refusal of the postmaster general to have transmitted over the telegraph wires certain matter criticizing the postmaster general. The New York World knew that this was a base lie when it published it. Mr. Post knew this was a base lie when he repeated it. As they well know, the postmaster general never at any time directed the exclusion of any matter offered for transmission on the wires, but on the contrary, has ordered that even libelous matters against him shall not be refused, though the sending of such matter is prohibited by rules of the companies enforced for many years."

"Mr. Post fails to disclose the amount of money raised by him to repeat this legislation, or in what manner it was spent. I am sure this would be very illuminating to the public. He indulges in much juggling of figures relating to postal subsidies and deficits. This shall avail nothing by way of confusing the public if the postmaster general can prevent it. The issue is, shall certain newspapers and magazines enjoy a postage rate on their commodity, a large part of which is not only purely commercial, but highly profitable advertising, which entitles on the postal establishment for its transmission an annual loss of \$72,000,000 to be borne by other users of the mails in an unjust tax upon them. The postmaster general believes that this is outrageous and indefensible, and has said so. The congress has partly corrected the wrong. The postmaster general has refused to acquiesce or aid in reducing this action."

**MUST NOT NEGLECT MERCHANT MARINE**

National Cotton Manufacturers' Association Told of Opportunity now Knocking at Door.

New York, April 24.—America can afford to charge up to wastage the cost of her war born mercantile marine but she can not afford to neglect the trade opportunities it offers, declared George W. Norris of Philadelphia in an address here today at the annual convention of the National Cotton Manufacturers' Association.

Mr. Norris said it might be better for private capital to barter government boat manned by naval reserve crews than to buy the craft outright. This course, he said, would reduce demands on capital, facilitate enrollment of the necessary personnel and avoid injury to the shipbuilding industry by throwing so much tonnage on the market.

The merchant marine question also was discussed by William Porter White of Lowell, Mass., and J. D. Massey of Columbus, Ga., while "Labor Conditions" was the topic selected by Henry H. Kendall of Boston.

Harry P. Atwood, of Chicago, author and attorney, another speaker asserted that if the people of the United States would return to their constitution "and follow it strictly they would find in it an antidote for Bolshevism."

"Every State in the Union instead of using the constitution as a model is trying to see how far they can vary from it," he asserted.

"You business men want to strip the federal government of every board and commission. We had few the first hundred years and it is quite time we returned to these simpler forms."

**LOADED TROOPSHIP NEARLY HITS MINE**

Giant Troopship Leviathan Misses Mine Off New Foundland by Only 30 Feet.

New York, April 25.—The giant troopship Leviathan with 12,000 soldier passengers, last of six transports to arrive here today bringing 22,972 men, missed a mine by only 30 feet while off the grand banks of Newfoundland Tuesday morning, her officers reported when she docked tonight.

Officers of the ship said the Leviathan had been warned to look out for a floating mine the day before by the transport Mount Vernon which had preceded them. On receipt of the radio warning the course of the Leviathan was changed and she sailed nearly one hundred miles to the southward of the location of the mine as given by the other transport.

The floating mine machine was sighted dead ahead of the transport, the officers said at 10:20 a. m. by Lieutenant Commander Harold Cunningham, who was on the bridge. Quick thinking and quick action was all that averted a collision. A desperate whirl of the wheel sent the great steamship past the mine with a margin of safety of ten yards.

None of the soldiers aboard knew until they docked how close they had been to danger, for the officers kept the incident to themselves, believing that if it became known it might cause needless alarm.

The six transports, carrying 22,702 troops, including 15,204 members of the forty-second (Rainbow) division, and 1,209 members of the seventy-seventh (Liberty) division, (New York), arrived here today from French ports. This is one of the largest single day troop arrivals in this port.

The transport Mount Vernon with 5,773 troops on board came up the bay shortly after sun-rise this morning and was followed an hour later by the battleship North Carolina carrying 1,593 more. The cruiser Montana with 1,500 soldiers, the passenger liner La Touraine with 289 casuals, and the transport Prinz Friedrich Wilhelm with 1,660 all arrived by early afternoon.

Major General George W. Read returned on the Leviathan in command of the troops of the 42nd division.
