

GREATEST HERO OF THE WAR MARRIES

Simplest Ceremonies Marked Wedding of Sergeant York and Mountain Girl, Tennessee Governor Performs Ceremony.

Pall Mall, Tenn., June 7.—Alvin Callom York, who outfought and outshot a German battalion in the Arsonne Forest surrendered to his boyhood sweetheart when he became the husband of Miss Grace Williams on the bluff above Big Springs at noon today, Governor Roberts of Tennessee, performing the ceremony which took place before three thousand mountaineers from the Cumberland plateau.

Miss Williams was given in marriage by her father, Franklin Asbury Williams, and her attendants were Miss Ida Wright and Miss Adelia Darwin of Pall Mall and Miss Bertha Bryer of Jamestown. Sergeant York's best man was Sergeant Henry Clay Bryer, a boyhood friend from Jamestown. Sergeant York was in the uniform of a colonel of the Tennessee Guards, having been named on the governor's staff for life by Governor Roberts. His best man was in khaki and there was a goodly sprinkling of khaki-clad veterans of the war in the assemblage.

The bride was attired in white satin, without a veil, and carried a bouquet of white roses. There was no music and the marriage ceremony itself occupied less than five minutes.

Big Spring Bluff is a part of the York farm which begins at the rise of the ground which marks the northern limits of the Valley of the Wolf and extends back into the highlands toward the Kentucky line.

The ceremony was performed in a natural amphitheater studded with huge boulders which served as seats. A large flat rock half way up the hill served as a natural altar while a massive bench at its side sheltered the bridal party from the sun's rays.

It was a big day for Pall Mall. It was a bigger day for Fentress county, for while it not only marked the culmination of a romance look looked for in Pall Mall, it was the day set apart for Fentress county to do honor to

all the veterans of the world war who have returned from France.

At night long, the mountain families were wending their way through the hills and by four o'clock this morning the "Jintown" pike was filled with people on foot, on horseback, in surries and in lumber wagons. The York home on the pike was the mecca of hundreds of old friends who gathered to pay their respects to the aged mother of the bridegroom and many found their way to the home of the bride.

Jamestown was filled to overflowing Friday night. The hotel and boarding houses were unable to accommodate the visitors and at every house down the 13-mile mountain trail late arrivals found shelter to occupy extra beds and in many cases to sleep on the floor.

Sergeant York was up early to await the arrival of Governor Roberts and staff, who remained at Jamestown overnight. The governor's arrival in Pall Mall was followed by a rehearsal of the ceremony at the home of the bride.

At 11:30 a. m. the procession led by the governor's staff, climbed the hill from the York home to the scene of the ceremony. J. T. Wheeler of Fentress county was master of ceremonies, introducing Governor Roberts who spoke for half an hour before reading the marriage ritual.

MANY MURDERED BY YAQUI IN MEXICO

Two Americans and 39 Mexicans Killed in Past Two Weeks, Miners Report. Report is Sent to State Department.

Nogales, Arizona, June 7.—Two Americans and thirty Mexicans have been killed by Yaquis and bandits in the La Colorado district of Sonora, Mexico, during the last two weeks, according to the statement of nine American mining men who arrived from that neighborhood tonight.

The party of Americans, whose homes are in Arizona, Colorado and California, have sent a statement on conditions in that district to the state department at Washington with copies

to Senators Thomas of Colorado, Johnson of California, and Marcus Smith, and Handy T. Ashurst, of Arizona.

In the report on affairs in Sonora forwarded to the state department by the returned mining men it is stated that nineteen Mexicans were killed by Mexican bandits and one American, Charles Morgan, was shot in the foot in a raid at Navojoa; that five Mexicans were killed by the Mexican bandits at Nury, twelve miles from where H. S. White, an American truck driver of Tucson, Arizona, was slain recently.

It is believed now White was killed by Mexican bandits and not by Yaquis as was first reported since the tracks of his slayers showed they wore shoes and not the Yaqui sandals.

The murder of C. W. P. Tevotee, mining engineer, three days ago, undoubtedly was the work of the Yaqui says the returned men.

The Mexicans in the automobile with Tevotee and four other Mexicans accompanying the party on horseback also are reported to have been killed at the same time.

The mining men who arrived tonight also brought the news that after Mexican truck drivers and helpers had been shot to death, Yaquis or bandits burned two auto trucks belonging to J. F. McFarland, owner of the El Progreso mine near La Colorado.

The statement continues as follows:

"It is current talk that ammunition is sold direct to Yaqui Indians coming and going from Arizona; also that the Papago Indians in the neighborhood of Indians Oasis southwest of Tucson are furnishing ammunition to Yaquis.

"Cannot some pressure be brought to bear on the Yaquis of Arizona that will have the effect of stopping the murder of Americans in Sonora, Mexico. Are the Yaquis not at war with the United States, the same as Germany with their killing and pillaging of Americans?"
