**GERMAN ASSEMBLY RATIFIES TREATY**

Violent Speeches Precede Passage of Resolutions. Dr. Mueller Urges Immediate Action.

Weimer, July 9.—The resolution ratifying the peace treaty was adopted by the German national assembly today by a vote of 208 to 115.

The text of the ratification resolution as introduced in the national assembly consisted of two clauses reading as follows:

"The peace treaty between Germany and the allied and associated powers signed on June 28, 1919, and the protocol, bringing thereto as well as the agreement relative to the occupation of the Rhineland, signed the same day are agreed to.

"This law comes into force on the day of its promulgation."

Most of the ministers were present at the meeting of the national assembly and there was a full attendance of deputies. Dr. Hermann Mueller, foreign minister, in introducing the government bills, explained that the hastening of the ratification order would bring about the lifting of the blockade.

"We are about to enter upon a 10 years march through a desert," he said. "I can find no other term for the path of suffering fulfillment of the treaty prescribed for us."

Dr. Peters Shahn, leader of the Catholic center party, said:

"We agreed to the treaty under hard compulsion, to save ourselves from anarchy and to preserve the fatherland from internal ruin."

Herr Greitz, Socialist; Professor Schuecking, Democrat; Dr. Traub, National Party, and Herr Khai, People's Party, all violently protested against the injustice of the treaty, the impossibility of its fulfillment, and declaring that the day of Germany's liberation will come.

These speeches were greeted with such turbulent applause and hand-clapping that the president of the assembly, Herr Fehrenbach, called attention to the fact that handclapping was against the rules, and threatened to have the galleries cleared. The debate, however, proceeded with similar speeches by other members and similar applause.

The National party introduced an amendment in favor of ratifying with the express reserve that the sanction of international law experts of Europe should first be obtained concerning Articles 227 and 230 and that a neutral court should be created to investigate the responsibility for the war.

In the course of the debate President Rehrenbach protested against Alsace-Lorraine being torn from Germany. He said that the treaty of 1871 simply made good what had been taken from Germany 150 years before. He hoped that the people of Alsace-Lorraine would preserve their German character, customs and civilization.

Part 7 of the peace treaty, comprising Articles 227 to 230, relates to penalties. Article 227 arraigns the former German emperor for "a supreme offense against international morality and the sanctity of treaties." The other articles relate to the bringing before military tribunals of persons accused of having committed acts in violation of the laws and customs of war; to the handing over of these persons by Germany and to an undertaking by the German government to furnish all documents and information of every kind bearing on these offenses and violation.

**TO OPPOS COVENANT**

Many Meetings are Planned Against League of Nations.

Washington, July 13.—A mass meeting in protest against the league of nations has been arranged "in nearly every large city," said an announcement tonight by the League for the Preservation of American Independence. Speakers who will appear under the auspices of the organization include Senators Reed (Missouri), and Borah (Idaho), Johnson (California), Poindexter (Washington) and Former Senator Beveridge of Indiana. No dates nor itinerary was announced, but it was said efforts would be concentrated in Western States.

**ACCUSED MACON MAN DESTROYS OWN LIFE**

L. G. Stripling, Former City Detective, Indicted for Murder, Shoots Self.

Macon, Ga., July 13.—L. G. Stripling, 38, one of six former city detectives recently indicted for the murder of Phillip Lamar and Abraham Kimbrell, alleged robbers, shot and killed himself at his home here this morning.

W. O. Swift, who was with Stripling when the shooting occurred and who is alleged to have fired one of the shots, was convicted of murder by a jury here on Friday and given a life term on the recommendation of the jury.

Stripling was on bail and was to come to trial at the November term of court. When he was released from jail on bail he told the jailer that he would never turn the key on him again, if developed at the coroner's inquest today.

Stripling was a member of a prominent middle Georgia family, married and the father of a 14-year-old boy.

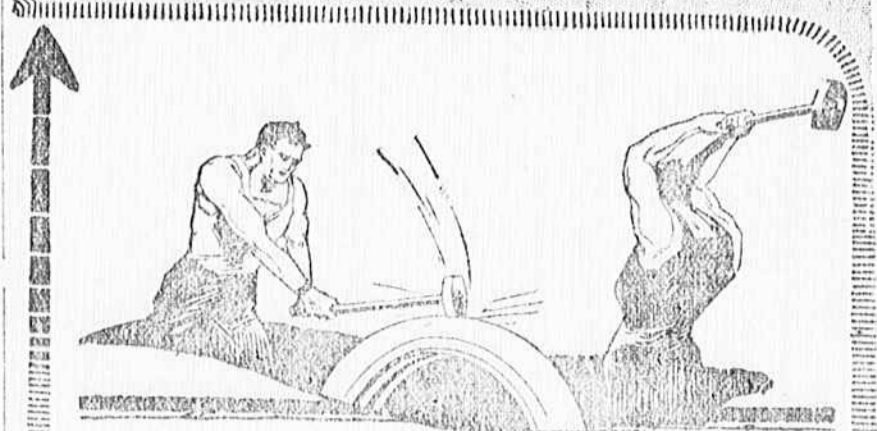
