

CROSS HILL NEWS.

Cross Hill, Sept. 1.—The meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union auxiliary to the Laurens Baptist Association held at the Cross Hill Baptist church last Wednesday was a very important one in several respects, and perhaps the greatest meeting this organization has ever held. The attendance was very good, practically every local Union being represented, the reports from all Unions and Auxiliaries were excellent, showing splendid work during the year. The addresses were full of the Spirit and enthusiasm of the Master and perfect harmony pervaded all deliberations. The chief subject for discussion was the 75 million campaign, which was quite interestingly and enthusiastically spoken to by State Secretary, Mrs. Carpenter, of Charleston, Miss Azile Wolford, Mr. C. One important action taken by the body was to assume the responsibility of raising one-fifth of the amount apportioned to the Laurens Association, \$285,196, which part is \$57,039.20. The next meeting will be held with Warrior Creek church in 1920.

The Union Meeting of the Fourth Division of Laurens Association, was also held with the Cross Hill Baptist church Saturday and Sunday. This was also an interesting meeting enjoyed by all who attended. The program contained a number of topics pertaining to Christian life and work which were discussed by the several delegates Saturday. On Sunday morning after Sunday School, Rev. C. E. Vermillion, of Laurens, spoke earnestly to the subject, "Why the 75 Million Campaign," after which the missionary sermon was preached by Rev. S. H. Templeman, of Laurens. The speaker used for his subject the Meal Offering, described in the book of Leviticus, and the discourse was an appeal for sacrifice in Kingdom service. One and feature of this meeting was the absence of Senator John H. Wharton, who had never missed a meeting of this Union before in many years. Expressions of regret and sympathy because of his sickness were heard on every hand and the prayers of the body went up in his behalf.

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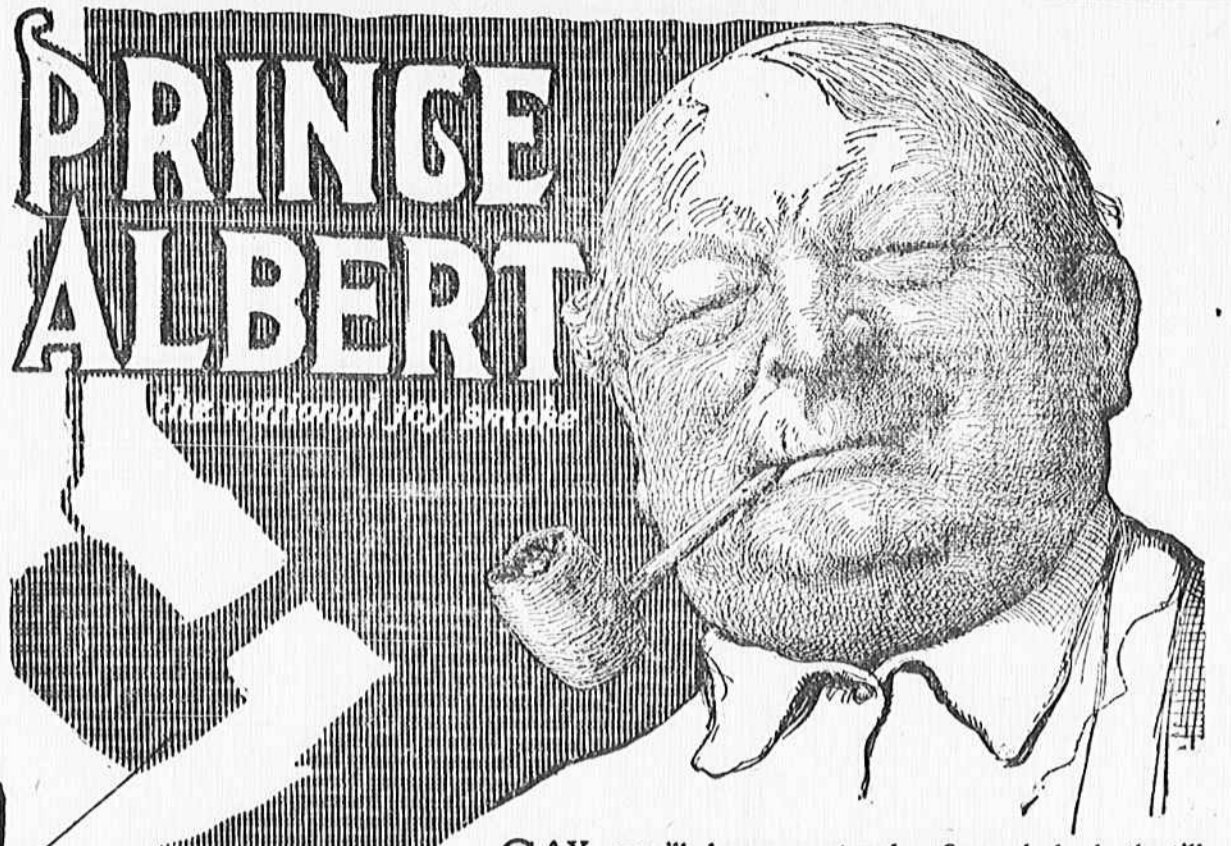
