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PHYSICAL FITNESS **URGED UPON BOYS**

State Board of Health Presents Physical Fitness Campaign in High

Monday morning November 22, he State Board of Health with the cooperation of the State Y. M. C. A., presented to the boys of the high school the physical fitness campaign promoted by the U. S.
