WILSON AND BRYAN DIFFER ON LEAGUE

(Continued from Page One.)

America and the judgment of the people is entered."

Former Ambassador Gerard: "The country demands that both sides get together, that a compromise be made and peace given the world."

Former Speaker Clark: "Democratic accomplishments during the last six years entitle the party to a long lease of power."

The host of Democrats on hand for the dinner had swamped the available accommodations of any one hotel in town and the party was divided into two dinners at two separate hotels a block apart. National Chairman Cummings presided at one and Vice Chairman Kremer at the other. The dining rooms were packed, tickets were at a premium and there were many disappointed ones who had to content themselves with straining their ears at the doors.

Both dinners began with toasts drunk to the health of President Wilson, the guests elevating goblets of Potomac river water.

At the dinner where Mr. Cummings presided, Vice President Marshall was seated at the right and Secretary Lansing at the left. Two women, Mrs. George Bass of Colorado and Mrs. Charles Tiffany, of New York, were at the speakers' table. At the dinner over which Mr. Kremer presided Mrs. Peter Olsen of Minnesota sat at the speakers' table.

The same set of speakers addressed both dinners, going from one to the other in various orders. At some time during the evening both parties of diners were addressed by Senator Hitchcock, Governor Cornwell of West Virginia; Governor Cox, of Ohio; Jas. W. Gerard, Senator Underwood, Secretary Daniels, Former Speaker Champ Clark, Attorney General Palmer, Mrs. Olsen, Senator Pomeroy, Senator Owen and William J. Bryan. Former Secretary McAdoo's telegram and President Wilson's message was read to each.

Everybody at both places was buzzing with suppressed excitement to know what President Wilson and Mr. Bryan were going to say. There were rumors of a split in sentiment between the president and his former secretary of state over the peace treaty question and the air seemed to be full of electricity.

When Chairman Cummings in his opening speech declared "tonight we invoke the militant spirit of Andrew Jackson," there was a roar of applause and cheers, and another when he declared the Democrats looked forward to the campaign of 1920 with the utmost confidence. Led by Representative Heflin of Alabama, the diners rose and cheered the chairman's reference to President Wilson's "wise leadership."

There was not a sound in the big dining hall when Chairman Cummings began reading President Wilson's letter, but there was vigorous cheering at the first reference to failure of the senate to ratify the peace treaty.

Another and greater outburst greeted the President's statement that personally he did not accept the action of the senate in failing to ratify the decision of the nation.

Everybody stood at the conclusion of the reading and cheered. "Hail, Hail the gang's All Here" was sung. "Dixie" started the diners up again, the demonstration continuing several minutes.

At the other banquet hall Vice Chairman Kremer's first mention of President Wilson's name brought the diners to their feet cheering, and the reading of the president's message frequently was interrupted by cheering and rebel yells.

Senator Underwood, who announced today that he was not a candidate for the presidency, said it was wise to remember that the Democratic party, through its long history, had never entered a campaign for the mere purpose of victory or for winning the spoils of office. It lived because it stood for certain fundamental principles, he added.

There is one issue that the Democratic party will carry to the country this year, he declared. "The position of the president can not be questioned. No man can question where the Democracy of the senate stands."

"The issue is clear. The president has defied it beyond cavil. The Democrats stand for reservations that do not destroy the covenant. There is but one course—to take the issue to the country for another congress to determine."

DOCTORS PUZZLED BY A NEW MALADY

Epidemic Prevailing in Mid-West States and is Believed to be Form of Flu.

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 13.—Whether the mysterious intestinal malady which has affected several hundred persons in Kansas and Oklahoma exists in other communities of the south-

west today was a matter for speculation, pending reports, officials of the two states were trying to identify the disease and employ means for checking its spread.

Topeka, Kans., and Muskogee, Okla., apparently were the worst sufferers. At Topeka 200 cases had been reported and unofficial estimates placed the number at 1,000. Many school children were among those ill. At Muskogee there were about 300 cases.

No fatalities were reported at either place and the death list from the malady remained at four, all at Skiatook, the little Oklahoma town where it first became prevalent. The situation at Skiatook was believed to be under control, however.

State health department inspectors sent to Skiatook to investigate were expected to furnish information today that would assist the authorities in classifying the epidemic.

Conferences of physicians were held last night at Topeka and Muskogee. Some of the doctors expressed the belief that the malady was a form of dysentery, while others were of the opinion it was a gastric form of influenza.
