HOLLAND REFUSES ALLIED DEMANDS

Dutch Government, for Second Time, Declines to Deliver up Former Kaiser. Says Her Supreme Duty is to Laws of Kingdom.

The Hague, March 5.—The Dutch government for the second time has refused the demand of the allies to deliver the former German emperor for trial.

In the note which went forward today, the government, while appreciating the motives actuating the allies, declares its inability to change its previous decisions. It says it is not forgetful of the inhuman acts committed during the war, but since Holland is not a party to the Versailles treaty, the queen's government finds itself in a different position from other powers with regard to these acts.

"Since the government's supreme duty is to respect the constitutional laws of the kingdom, the note continues, "it can only emphasize that it would be committing an act contrary of law and justice and incompatible with the national honor if it consented to violate these laws by abolishing the rights accorded to a fugitive finding himself on Dutch territory."

Protesting that this attitude does not put Holland outside the community of nations, the note declares Holland is fully conscious of the duties the presence of the former emperor places on the Netherlands government with regard to the country's own interests, as well as international security.

The note protests that contrary to the impression derived from the allied note, the Dutch government from the beginning has observed the obligation entailed by these duties. The government, the note says, will continue to do so, being able in the exercise of Dutch sovereignty, to take on the spot all precautionary measures deemed requisite to subject the freedom of the former emperor to necessary limitations.

The Netherlands government says it is anxious to place these declarations on record in the most formal manner, and in conclusion declares it is to be its opinion that these declarations, which prove that the government realizes the dangers which the powers dread, will dispel their apprehensions.

The note is signed by Ponkherr Von Karnebeek, Dutch foreign minister.

TWO TRAINMEN KILLED IN WRECK

Two Killed and 15 Passengers Injured When Florida Special is Derailed.

Wilson, N. C., March 5.—Engineer Robert Wilson of Rocky Mount, N. C., and George Kent, his negro fireman, were killed and fifteen passengers were badly shaken up and suffered minor injuries this afternoon when the Florida special of the Atlantic Coast Line, known as train No. 86, northbound, was wrecked two miles south of Lucama. The cause of the derailment has not been determined.

Physicians and nurses were sent by special train from Wilson to the scene of the wreck and fifteen passengers applied for first aid treatment, all suffering from scratches and bruises, but none were seriously hurt, according to reports received here. All the injured continued their journey northward on another train, which is being detoured via Smithfield and Godfords to Rocky Mount.

The train was running about eight hours late, it is said, when the derailment occurred. The negro fireman was instantly killed, but Engineer Wilson lived about two hours after being taken from the wreckage.

Besides the engine, the baggage car, postal storage car, negro coach, day coach and several Pullmans left the rails. The road will be blocked for about twelve hours, railway officials say. Wreckers from Rocky Mount and Florence, S. C., are clearing up the wreckage.

NEW TESTAMENT'S TEXT CONFIRMED BY ARCHAEOLOGY

(The Sun and New York Herald.)

A great feat of recent archaeological research has been to demonstrate the accuracy with which the text of the New Testament has come down to us from the original manuscripts of the first century. In the words of Professor Camden M. Cobern of Allegheny College, "The new discoveries have proved beyond doubt that the New Testament text was transmitted with remarkable accuracy and scrupulousness, so that it can be trusted more confidently than any other ancient record."

This conclusion is based upon the examination and comparison of thousands of manuscripts, chiefly papyri, some of which are older than any known to scholars before the present generation. Forty years ago no scholar had ever read a manuscript written during the life time of Jesus in the language commonly spoken and written in that era. No New Testament manuscript known was older than the fourth century A. D., and only three or four were older than the sixth century. We now have many fragments of ancient New Testaments written on papyrus between the third and sixth centuries, some of them being a hundred years earlier than any previously known, and these New Testaments are "in every essential exactly like our own."

The accepted text is also strongly confirmed by tens of thousands of Syriac, Coptic and Latin texts representing various versions of the New Testament or ancient writings containing quotations from the New Testament. If an Arabic translation of Tatian's Harmony of the Gospels, written in Syriac about 160 A. D., truly represents the original, and scholars generally believe it does, it gives us the text of the Gospels which was accepted by Christians within two generations of Saint John's death. A Syriac New Testament found by Mrs. Agnes Smith Lewis and Mrs. Margaret Gibson in the Convent of Saint Catherine at Mount Sinai in 1892 is believed to give proper names and many phrases in the exact form in which the disciples of Jesus uttered them. The differences in the various texts now available for comparison, Dr. Cobern says, are not nearly so strongly marked as those between the Revised Version and the Twentieth Century New Testament.

First of the new discoveries in logical order was that made by Adolf Diessmann that the great mass of Greek documents from the first and adjoining centuries recently dug up—legal and business documents and private letters—were all written in the language of the New Testament. The difference therefore between classic Greek and the Greek of the New Testament is the same as the difference between literary English and the ordinary spoken language. In other words it was not Wycliffe who first gave the New Testament to the people in the language of the people but it was Paul and Mark and Luke.

The discovery at once disposed of many obscurities, supposed mistakes and difficulties which had perplexed scholars in the New Testament. In an account of all these discoveries Professor Cobern says in the Biblical Review:

"One consequence of this new discovery is that we must now give up our old confidence that a theological doctrine can be proved by some change of tense or any other minute grammatical form. Many of the arguments which have contributed much to denominational controversy and some which have convulsed Christianity have now been necessarily thrown into the scrap heap."

The papyri cast new light on well known Biblical words and phrases. Judas not only "bare" but "bare off," that is, stole the money bag (John xii:6). The beam in the eye of the pharisaic critic (Matt. vii:3) becomes a splinter. Paul did not say "I have kept the faith," in the sense of being doctrinally steadfast, but did say, "I have loyally guarded the trust." Jesus is called not the "captain" of our salvation but the "founder" or "originator" of that salvation. Our calling and election are made not merely "sure" but "legally secure."

As to the theological revelations of the new discoveries Dr. Cobern says: "There is but one theology in the thousands of early Christian documents and inscriptions which have been dug up from the first four centuries—the theology of Saint Paul. Christ's deity, virgin birth, pre-existence and atonement through His death for the sin of the world are everywhere in existence. These doctrines are not brought in as if they were a matter of controversy, but incidentally, as if they were believed by all Christians."

It is especially interesting to note that numbers of the supposed mistakes of the New Testament texts are grammatical or chirographic faults peculiar to the first century vernacular,

thus offering a totally new and unexpected mark of antiquity. Great papyrological experts, says Dr. Cobern, now seem with practical unanimity ready to date almost every New Testament document back to the first century because of these first century marks.

Gold Stone.
 Gold stone is a sort of an opaque golden brown glass filled with minute crystals of a bright gold color, and of various sizes. It is used for ornamental purposes. Its preparation was accidentally discovered at Murano, near Venice, Italy, when a quantity of brass filings dropped into a pot of melted glass.

Too Precious to Part With.
 New paper guilder currency recently issued in Java by the Javasche bank was so admired by the Chinese and natives when first issued that it was hoarded. The notes were printed by an American company, and include 2½-guilder and 1-guilder denominations. They were intended to relieve the present scarcity of silver coins.
