WELL KNOWN HOTEL BURNS TO GROUND

Chamberlin, Old Point Comfort, Destroyed. May be Loss of Life.

The Chamberlin was built in the early '80s by John Chamberlin, famous in his day as proprietor of Chamberlin's, a restaurant at Washington, which was the gathering place of men high in public life. A seven story frame structure, it stood on the water front, close by the fort, and in late years there was talk of razing it to make room for development of the army post. But the hotel had become such a vital part of army and navy life at Old Point that it remained.

Before the war when the fleets sailed in and out of Hampton Roads the Chamberlin generally was filled with officers' wives, and the greatest naval assemblage came here to witness the departure of the American fleet on its voyage around the world.

Army officers who took charge of the reservation immediately after the fire started said tonight the hotel probably would not be rebuilt, and certainly not on the old site.


