Whereas, petitions signed by a legal number of the qualified electors and free-holders residing in Dials school district No. 6, Laurens County, South Carolina, asking for an election upon the question of voting an additional 3 mill tax upon the property in said school district, to be used for school purposes, have been filed with the county board of education, an election is hereby ordered upon said question, said election to be held on the 17th day of June, 1920, at Barksdale School Building, in said district, under the management of the trustees of said school district.

REPUBLICANS AT WORK ON PLATFORM

Plank for Treaty of Versailles Provides Most Difficult One to be Formed.

Chicago, June 2.—With the convention circle of party leaders virtually complete, the Republican platform builders went seriously to work tonight on the more troublesome of the planks remaining to be fashioned.

One of these was the declaration on the treaty of Versailles and the league of nations; a subject of long standing disagreement and bitter controversy. Another dealt with the industrial relations, bringing into contrast widely diverse schools of economic thought. A third related to Mexico, always a topic of debate, and now somewhat complicated by recent developments south of the Rio Grande.

On all of these, entire harmony was predicted by all the party leaders, although most of them conceded that some interesting scrimmages possibly reaching the convention floor would have to be fought out before there could be an agreement.

With the belated arrival from Washington of several senators, representing extremes of Republican opinion on the treaty, the long senate fight over the league of nations virtually was transferred to the conference rooms here.

The irreconcilables and the mild reservationists of the senate are prepared for a hard battle on the treaty plank. Senator Borah of Idaho, a leader of the irreconcilables, is late in the day with a plank which will have the backing of the Johnson forces. The mild reservationists held numerous conferences and prepared to draft a plank for submission to Ogdin Mills, chairman of the executive committee on policies and platforms.

"We will submit our plank to the resolutions committee," said Senator Borah, "and if we do not see it in the platform, we will offer it in the convention."

With the plank on Mexico in its formative stage, there was a general feeling that little trouble would be encountered in bringing an agreement. The declarations prepared at Washington by Senator Fall, of New Mexico, however, providing for American intervention unless Mexico mended its ways, ran into some opposition and it was suggested that it might be modified to omit altogether the reference to possible military interference by this government in the regime in Mexico City should be withheld until certain guarantees had been made. There would be an attack on President Wilson's Mexico policy and a general statement on the necessity of protecting American rights. Two former American ambassadors to Mexico, Henry P. Fletcher of Pennsylvania, and Henry Lane Wilson, of Indiana, are in consultation here with other leaders on the subject.

Shaping the industrial relations plank revived many old animosities and brought into focus several of the issues raised by recent strikes and unrest. On this plan the supporters of Senator Johnson are generally expected to have a program of their own and various other elements of the party are counted on to bring in proposals that will run counter to the views of some delegates. None of these elements has yet disclosed its hand, however, and the whole subject is in flux.

RIGHTS OF PUBLIC NOT SUPERIOR TO TOILER'S DECLARES SAM GOMPERS

Washington, June 6.—"The public has no rights which are superior to the toiler's right to live and to his right to defend himself against oppression," Samuel Gompers declared in his referred replies to three questions asked him by Governor Allen, of Kansas, in their debate at New York May 28. Mr. Gompers' replies were made public tonight by the American Federation of Labor.

Governor Allen asked whether the public has any rights in a strike "affecting the production or distribution of the necessities of life, thus threatening the public peace and impairing the public health," and if so, how would Mr. Gompers protect those rights. He also asked who controlled the "divine right" of employes to quit work.

Declaring that union men and women formed one-fourth of the public, Mr. Gompers said strikes in which the public peace have been threatened, "usually have been strikes in which the employers, or public officials influenced by employers, have created the breach of peace by the use of thugs, armed guards and detectives."

"Labor," continued Mr. Gompers, "has no desire to cause inconvenience to the public of which it is a part. The right to strike must be and will be maintained, not only as a measure of self defense and self advancement, but as a measure necessary to public progress."

PLAN FOR MEXICO WILL BRING WAR

Prediction Made by Samuel Gompers, Scores Face Report.

Washington, June 3.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, declared in a formal statement tonight that war between the United States and Mexico would result from the carrying out of the recommendations of the senate committee which investigated Mexican affairs.

"The report of the senate subcommittee investigating conditions in Mexico, under the chairmanship of Senator Albert B. Fall," Mr. Gompers said, "amounts to a declaration that unless the government of Mexico rewrites its constitution in accordance with the idea of American oil and mining interests the government of the United States will 'intervene' in Mexico."

"The report of Senator Fall's committee demands a number of specific changes in the Mexican constitution. These changes would be the consum-

mation of what has been long the hopes of the great oil and mining interests, as well as the land and timber interests which have fomented the bitterness between the people of the United States and Mexico.

"It is difficult to believe that the

senate will give serious consideration to a report so out of harmony with the best thought of our time, and so full of the possibilities of dire consequences to our people and our nation as well as to a neighbor reputable with which we are at peace.

"The report calls for American aid to Mexico providing Mexico agrees to the terms of the report. This is not an American proposition. It is a Prussian proposition. It must be set aside by the popular opinion and fair judgment of our people."
