Did Joseph Bowne Elwell Commit Suicide or Was He Murdered? Baff-

New York, June 11 .- Mystery deep-Bowne Elwell, internationally known as an authority on whist, and owner of a racing stable, who was found un-Mr. Jeff Willis, of Greenville, spent conscious in his West Seventieth street Friday and Saturday with Mr. and home early today with a bullet wound in his head. He died four hours later

The police admitted tonight it was one of the most baffling mysteries with which they have had to deal in a Mrs. Smith Martin and children, and long time. In an effort to determine whether Mr. Elwell was murdered or committed suicide his associates in the social and club life of the city were closely questioned by the police, who declined to reveal the result of their investigation. The mystery was intensified by failure of the police to find the weapon with which Mr (Elwell had been shot,

It became kilown tonight that Mr. Elwell dined on the Ritz Carlton roof and Mr. Allen, his choir leader, dined Thursday night with a party of friends who included Mr. and Mrs. Kraus, Mrs. Lewisohn's sister. There were four others in this party. Leaving the hotel the party went to a midnight theatrical performance and about 2 o'clock this morning Mr. Elwell bade good-bye to the Lewisohns at Broadway and Forty-second street.

They drove to their Fifth avenue home and Elwell strolled in the direction of Eighth avenue. Nothing more is known of his movements until his housekeeper, Mrs. Marie Larson, found him in the living room of his home at 8:30 tihs morning, seated in an arm chair facing the street window. A postman delivered mail at 7:30 a. m., which the police say was taken by Mr. Elwell. The circumstances indicate the shooting took place in the period that elapsed between the mail delivery and the arrival of his houskeeper.

The police are convinced robbery was not the motive for the crime, as Mr. Elwell's money and jewelry were found undisturbed. There were no signs of a struggle. The housekeeper said the doors were locked and the windows bore no signs of having been

Mr. Elwell was alone in the fourteen-room house. His bed had not been touched and his evening dress clothes had been folded and placed on the back of a chair after he had taken them off. An empty cartridge was found on the floor. The bullet, after passing through his head, imbedded itself in the wall.

There were no powder marks on his

Edward Rhodes, who had been Mr. Elwell's chaffeur for years, told the police many women had keys to his employer's home. He said Mr. Elwell returned from Palm Beach two

BURLESON REPLIES

TO REPUBLICANS

W. T. Putnam and family, Mr. and Postmaster General Issues Statement Declaring Arraignment Falls Harmless. Attacks Increase in Salary Measure.

Washington, June 13 .- Postmaster Cross Anchor, are visiting Mrs. W. T. General Burleson issued a statement today, declaring that "in the light of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Cook visited the truth" the "arraignment of the postal authorities" by the Republican party platform adopted at Chicago "falls harmless at their feet."

Replying to the declaration in the platform that the present administration destroyed "the efficiency of the telephone and telegraph service when controlled by the government," Mr. Burleson quotes from statements of the late Theodore N. Vail, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, President Carlton, of the Western Union Telegraph Company and others to show that the wire properties were successfully administered by the government and returned in good condition.

Mr. Burleson says the Republican organization in a tentative draft of its platform made a "sinister insinuation" that during government control the wires were used for purposes of "political patronage" and "political espionage." He declared that of the four new places created for the wire administration three were filled with

pionage."

This charge is not made without a purpose, he declared, adding:

"Watch the amount of a certain contribution to the Republican campaign fund and it will be disclosed that a certain interest, which having failed to control or even influence a Republican congress by slimy falsehoods, because both sides could be heard, temporarily got in its work on and apparently was not desired."

Taking up the platform's declaration commending the Republican congress for increasing the pay of postal employes, Mr. Burleson says that instead of adopting his plan "which would have resulted in an increase of salaries of postoffice clerks and city letter carriers to a maximum basis of \$2,062 yearly, and like increases to those in the other lines of postal activity" congress granted "a horizontal increase, which gives some an increase not deserved and denies to thousands of faithful and efficient employes increases commensurate with their work and to which they are faithfully entitled."
