S. C. LEGION IS OPPOSED TO SECESSION

Instructs Delegates to Fight Move for Bonus. State Executive Committee Lauded. Newberry Next Convention City.

Spartanburg, June 15.—The South Carolina department of the American Legion in convention here today went on record as being opposed to withdrawal from the national organization and as opposed to the legion's agitating a cash bonus for ex-service men. Delegates to the national convention were instructed to use every effort to have the national convention repudiate the activities of the national executive committee in regard to the cash bonus.

A resolution was passed commending the zeal of the executive committee in endeavoring to maintain strict adherence to the basic principles underlying the inception and birth of the American Legion.

The sessions of the convention were lively throughout the day. The question of withdrawal from the national organization, which was taken up at the morning session, provoked heated discussion at times. The bonus question, which came up during the afternoon session, was also very lively. Former Gov. D. C. Heyward delivered an inspiring address at the morning session.

There were about 400 delegates, representing nearly every post in South Carolina, on the floor of the convention hall. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon the ex-service men gathered at the chamber of commerce building, where they enjoyed a luncheon tendered them by the chamber of commerce.

Invitations for the next convention were extended by Greenville and Newberry. A movement to make Columbia the permanent meeting place of the convention was defeated.

G. H. Mahon, of Greenville, was elected commander of the South Carolina department, and Newberry was selected as the next convention city. J. Lyles Glenn, of Chester, was elected vice commander; Prof. Frank W. Bradley, of the University of South Carolina, state historian; Dr. J. W. Frazer, Spartanburg, chaplain.

The following were named on the executive committee: First district, J. G. Dinkins, Manning; Second district, H. E. Holly, Aiken; Third district, Harry R. Hughes, Walhalla; Fourth district, W. F. Robertson, Greenville; Sixth district, H. Kaminski, Georgetown; Seventh district, S. P. Hodges, Columbia. The two members at large are Henry C. Tillman, of Greenwood, and R. B. Fulton, Florence.

The following were elected delegates to the national convention of the American Legion, which meets in Cleveland, Ohio, September 27-29: Thomas B. Spratt, Port Mill; J. Monroe Johnson, Marion; Mendel L. Smith,

Camden; E. W. Middleton, Charleston; Jim Shepard, Edgelfield; Ben M. Sawyer, Columbia; Bernard Manning, Spartanburg; H. I. Ellerbee, Manning; Douglas Featherstone, Greenwood; Henry C. Moore, Gaffney.

Following are the resolutions adopted: "Whereas, the South Carolina department, American Legion, did not deem it wise to concur in the recommendation of its executive committee looking toward the withdrawal of our branch from the national organization, and

"Whereas, the state executive committee was actuated by the highest ideals and impelled by sincerest motives, and

"Whereas, their goal in endeavoring to maintain the honor and integrity of the Legion is both patriotic and commendable.

"Be it now therefore resolved, by the South Carolina branch American Legion, in convention duly assembled:

"First, That the South Carolina state executive committee be commended for their zeal in endeavoring to maintain strict adherence to the basic principles underlying the inception and birth of the American Legion.

"Second, that the thanks of the convention be extended them for their faithful service and their great sacrifices which they have made in their service to the Legion.

"Whereas, the American Legion was founded upon the principles of unselfishness and patriotism, and can fulfill its mission in this country only by remaining true to these principles, and

"Whereas, the American Legion at its first annual convention reaffirmed its adherence to these principles by declaring that it would not ask for legislation in its selfish interests, and

"Whereas, the national executive committee has, contrary to the fundamental principles of the legion, a resolution of the national convention and to the comparative neglect of the wounded and disabled, openly, actively and aggressively agitated and demanded a cash bonus for all ex-service men, regardless of disability, now, therefore

"Be it resolved by the South Carolina department of the American Legion in convention assembled,

"First, That we condemn in the strongest terms such activities of the national executive committee as inconsistent with the principles and ideals upon which the American Legion is founded and in flagrant disregard of the action of the national convention duly and solemnly expressed in its resolution upon the subject.

"Second, That it is the sense of this body that the state delegates to the national convention repudiate the activities of the national executive committee above referred to and such other action as will prevent further agitation and demand for a bonus or pension for able-bodied ex-service men."

VICTORY MEDALS BE DISTRIBUTED

Nearly Five Million Medals for Men Who Were Members of Armed Forces.

Washington, June 20.—Distribution of 4,765,000 Victory medals to members of the army, navy and marine corps who were in service between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, will begin tomorrow. In addition to the medal itself, the war department has authorized the issuance of thirteen "combat or major operation clasps," and a "Defensive Sector clasp" to be worn on a ribbon with the medal and five overseas service clasps for troops not entitled to the battle insignia.

Among the major operation clasps the Meuse-Argonne offensive leads in point of numbers, department records showing that 1,208,350 men are entitled to this decoration; the St. Mihiel drive is second, with 557,750 and the Aisne-Marne third, with 277,880.

The first victory medal was presented in February to President Wilson as commander in chief of the nation's military and naval forces.

Ravens of Tower of London.

The ravens are an institution in the Tower of London, although there is no record that they are one of its historic features. One of the yeoman warders has charge of the ravens, giving each a particular name, such as "James Crow, thief," if it suits the character of the bird.

LABOR INDORSES LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Covenant Approved Without Reservations. Opposition by Irish.

Montreal, June 19.—The American Federation of Labor adjourned its annual convention here tonight after endorsing the league of nations without reservations.

The closing session of the two weeks' convention was a stormy one. Irish sympathizers, supported by the progressive wing of the federation, opposed the movement to endorse the league and through the debate on the question President Samuel Gompers had difficulty in maintaining order. His gavel was smashed in his efforts to quiet the proceedings.

Mr. Gompers and the executive council will leave immediately for Washington to put into operation the program framed by the convention. The first move, it was said, will be launched against the Democratic national convention to obtain incorporation of the federation's program in the party platform. They will urge also that the federation's non-partisan political policy, which was unanimously approved by the convention, be carried out.

Labor's program, as outlined by the convention, demands:

- Ratification of the peace treaty.
- Government ownership with democratic operation of railroads.
- Curb on profiteering and high cost of living.
- Jailing of food and clothing profiteers.
- Right to strike and abolition of compulsory arbitration and anti-strike legislation.
- Hands off in Mexico by the United States government.
- Indorsement of the Irish republic.
- Right of collective bargaining.
- Advances in wages wherever necessary to maintain the American standard of living.
- Shorter work day, if necessary, to prevent unemployment.
