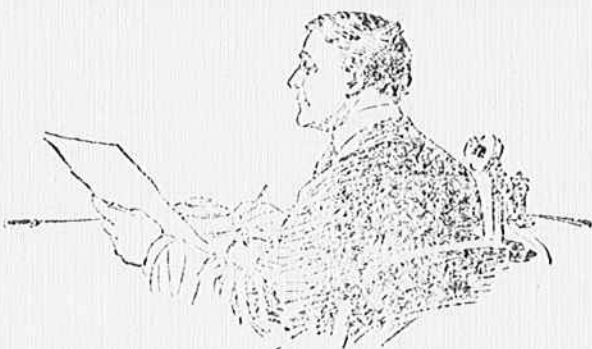

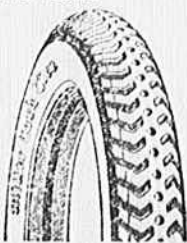

CRANK IS \$12,000 TO GOOD; STOLEN BABE IS YET GONE

George Coughlin Pays Big Sum in Dark, Then Realizes He's Been Badger Hunting.

Norristown, Pa., June 17.—The police again today took up the search for 13-months-old Blakeley Coughlin, stolen from his crib on June 2. At the same time they were looking for a person known only as the "Crank" who swindled George H. Coughlin, the baby's father, of \$12,000, which was demanded for the return of the little fellow.

After receiving several letters and telephone calls from "The Crank," Coughlin became convinced he was the abductor and asked the police to withdraw from the case so he personally could negotiate with the writer. "The Crank" at first demanded only \$6,000 ransom, but later doubled it. On Monday he called Mr. Coughlin on the telephone, and gave him instructions where to leave the money. He acquiesced in a request of the father that another man not connected with the police department accompany him to the spot, but designated they should not go to the place before midnight and that they must deposit the cash and drive away without making the slightest attempt to discover his identity. The child would be returned in a taxicab, "The Crank" said, within 24 hours.

Mr. Coughlin said he had complied with every demand of the kidnapper and felt confident the baby would be returned Tuesday night. Both he and Mrs. Coughlin remained up all night. At three o'clock the next afternoon he drove to the spot where he left the money and found it gone. He then gave up hope, he said, and realized that he had been defrauded. He placed the case in the hands of the authorities last night and announced he had abandoned all desire of dealing directly with the abductors, who had been promised immunity if the child was returned.

With the latest developments in the case, both the police and the Coughlins have abandoned the theory that the baby was kidnapped for ransom. They are inclined to believe that revenge was the motive. Charles Eiter, chief of the Norristown police, said he had a definite clue and expected results within a day or two.

POLLOCK TO STAND ON BIG PLATFORM

Former Senator Announces for U. S. Senate on Platform Adopted at Frisco.

Columbia, June 24.—Senator Pollock, who Saturday announced his candidacy for the United States senate against Senator E. D. Smith, made a statement regarding his platform, which he says is to be the same as that adopted at the national Democratic convention at San Francisco.

In addition to Mr. Pollock, three other candidates filed their campaign pledges Saturday. I. W. Blackwood, of Spartanburg, for solicitor; Jack H. Wilson, Spartanburg, for congress, and D. W. McCaskill, of Camden, for railroad commission. This makes four candidates for railroad commission, Frank W. Shealy, the incumbent, D. L. Smith and R. L. Moss, of Columbia, and Mr. McCaskill.

The candidates for state offices will speak first in Columbia; the candidates for the senate will speak first in Sumter. The time for filing campaign pledges expires at noon Monday. In making his announcement for the senate, Mr. Pollock states that he will make the campaign of the state.

"I feel confident," Mr. Pollock stated Saturday, "that the national Democratic convention which meets this month in San Francisco will adopt a platform of principles and policies in the interest of the great masses of the people, and that all true Democrats can stand upon the platform, as every candidate for the senate in this state must. I feel confident that the party will take on backward steps, but that it will advise wisely for the present, and will suggest proper measures for the future good of the people of the country. Upon that platform I shall stand."

Mr. Pollock expressed his appreciation of the election two years ago to the unexpired term of the late Senator Tillman, and said: "My term of those three months service was so short that I could not expect to make a record commensurate with the honor done me, but I crave the opportunity of serving for one full term at least in the senate, where I believe is the greatest field particularly for real service to mankind."

Mr. Pollock states that he does not propose to spend much money in making the campaign. He will not have any headquarters and will not send out letters. He states that he proposes merely to appear in person and to stand "on his character and fitness for the position."

WATERPOWER BILL BECOMES A LAW

Signed by Wilson, who Fails to Sign Resolution Designed to Aid Present Paper Situation.

Washington, June 18.—The water power development bill, ten years in the making, finally has become law. Announcement that President Wilson had signed the measure prior to June 11, was made late today at the White House. At the same time it was announced that he had failed to sign the joint resolution repealing most of the war time laws, and the Underwood resolution providing for negotiations with Canada relative to the embargo on the shipment of wood pulp to the United States.

Another bill which failed to receive the president's approval would have authorized the war department to transfer motor equipment to the department of agriculture for road construction and other work.

Besides the water power measure the president signed several bills passed in the closing days of the recent session of congress. They included an act authorizing the enlistment in the military forces of non-speaking English citizens and aliens; an act paying for a set of false teeth for Michael McGarvey and five bridge bills.

No explanation of the delay in announcing the president's approval of the water power measure was made. The White House statement said:

"The president having been advised by the attorney general in a formal opinion that the adjournment of congress does not deprive him of the ten days allowed by the constitution for the consideration of a measure, but only in case of disapproval of the opportunity to return the measure with his reasons to the house in which it originated, has signed the following bills, each within the ten day period, of course. The bills not signed failed to become law under the usual practice."

ILLITERACY FIGHT FOR THIS SUMMER

"Write-Your-Name Classes" and "Lay-by" Schools to be Formed. Teach 10,000.

The campaign for a literate State being conducted by the State department of education and the illiteracy commission, will be continued with increased vigor during the summer. The two outstanding features of the work will be the organization of "Write-Your-Name Classes" and "Lay-by" schools; the first, for the purpose of teaching every voter to sign his name to the Democratic club rolls and the second, for the purpose of teaching at least 10,000 men and women to read and write.

The "Lay-by" schools in which over 5,000 adults were enrolled last year will be reorganized in August, which has been selected as the time best suited for the adults because then many of the best teachers in the state can be secured for one month's teaching and because that is the vaca-

tion month for the majority of the people.

Any teacher holding a valid teacher's certificate or any person recommended to the State superintendent of education by the county superintendent of education in writing may organize a school. The minimum term will be 12 meetings of not less than one hour and a half for each meeting. The maximum term will be 20 meetings. Teachers will be paid \$1 an hour provided at least 10 pupils are enrolled with an average attendance of five. Any teacher may teach two separate groups. It is possible by this plan for a teacher to make \$100 for the scholastic month.

Eighteen counties have already notified the State department that they plan to put on an intensive campaign. County organizers are being employed whose duty it is to work in co-operation with the county superintendent of education for the promotion of the work. The State pays the teachers.
