Eliminate Poor Producing Hens

The County Home Demonstration Agent of Laurens county is planning a poultry culling campaign as a regular part of her yearly work. The campaign will be carried on from August 1st to October 15th, as it has been proven that best results are obtained during this season.

The purpose of the campaign is to enable the farm owner to realize a greater profit from the poultry flock. With the present prices of corn and other feed stuffs it is necessary to call out the poor producer or boarding hen; to save as much high priced feed as possible; to keep the best egg layers for another season; to provide sufficient space for this year's young stock, and thus make it possible to receive the greatest possible returns from the farm flock.

It has only been during the past few years that the culling work could be successfully carried on. The U. S. Department of Agriculture and the different state universities through the efforts of their poultry departments have been able to make a scientific study of poultry and it is through their efforts that the culling work had been made possible.

The selection of the good producing hens is very simple and most any one after a few moments practice can successfully perform the work. The time of year the hen sheds its feathers, the

color of the leg of the bird, comb condition and other simple physical characteristics are considered.

The County Home Demonstration Agent, Miss Daisy Harris, plans to hold a culling demonstration with each Women's Demonstration Club in the county. In addition many individual demonstrations will be given. In this manner it is hoped to reach a majority of the farm flocks in the county.

It is safe to say that fully 25 to 50 per cent of the hens which make up the farm flock of poultry do not lay enough eggs to pay for the feed they consume. Many hens are kept from three to five years on the farm and such individuals are always a loss to their owner. By keeping the best layers and culling out the poor producers a greater profit will be derived from the farm flock. Again eggs will be hatched from only the heavy layers and this will have a tendency to increase the laying qualities of the next generation. By disposing of all inferior hens during the early fall sufficient room is provided for this year's young stock. This will allow them more housing space and the health of the flock will be increased, thus causing a greater egg production.

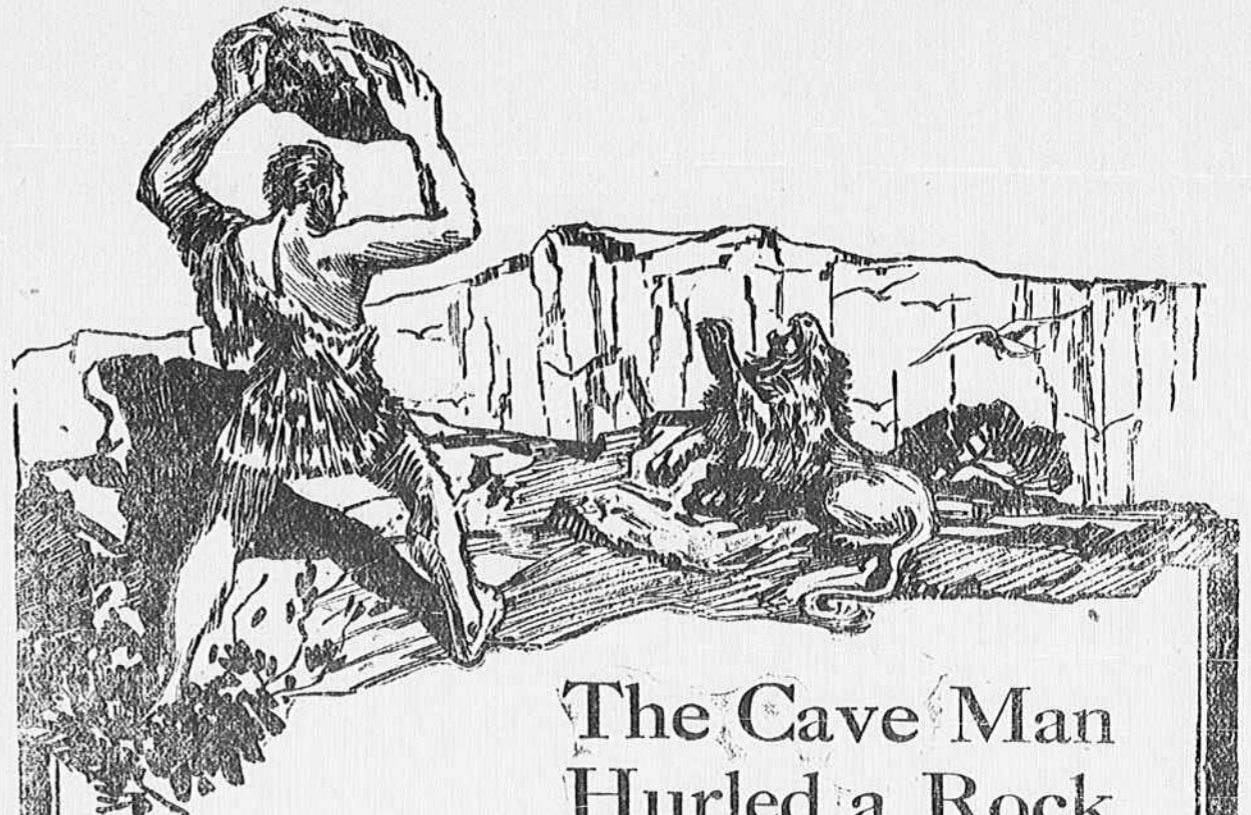
The governor spent the day at Landis in an effort to bring about a settlement of the strike trouble which started about five weeks ago when the

HARDING URGED TO BACK UP THE DRYS

Asked to Take Firm Stand in Support of Prohibition in His Speech of Acceptance.

Marion, Ohio, July 9.—Senator Harding the Republican candidate for president was urged to take a firm stand in support of national prohibition in his speech of acceptance, at a conference today with J. Frank Hanly, former governor of Indiana, and prohibition candidate for president in 1916. Later it was announced the senator had not committed himself regarding the matter, while Mr. Hanly said he hoped to be able to support him, but "would wait to see what the senator said in his speech."

Mr. Hanly announced he would not attend the national prohibition convention to be held in Lincoln, July 21, and that he opposed placing a national prohibition ticket in the field this fall.

"I simply presented my views, renewed old acquaintances and had a pleasant hour. I did not ask the senator for any commitments on those questions and he made none. I don't think the prohibition party ought to nominate a candidate."

Regarding the conference, Senator Harding said Mr. Hanly only "presented his views as to construction of the platform as others have done," adding "we are always glad to listen."

Plans for officially notifying Senator Harding of his nomination were announced today following a conference between the nominee and T. Coleman DuPont, of Delaware, chairman of the committee on arrangements for the Republican national committee and Harry M. Daugherty, of Columbus, the senator's manager in the pre-convention campaign.

The event will take place at 2 p. m., July 22, in Garfield Park on the outskirts of Marion, with National Chairman Will H. Hays presiding. Following the singing of the Star Spangled Banner by the Republican Glee Club of Columbus, invocation will be pronounced by Rev. T. M. McAfee, pastor of Trinity Baptist church of Marion, which the senator attends. Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, permanent chairman of the Chicago convention and chairman of the notification committee, will then deliver an address notifying the senator of his nomination to which the nominee will reply. Following the singing of America the ceremonies will close with a benediction by Rev. Joseph M. Jennings of St. Mary's church, of Marion.

The Republican national committee and the committee on arrangements will meet in Columbus on July 21. Mr. Daugherty will entertain at dinner members of both committees when campaign questions are expected to be discussed.

Another caller today was Henry L. Stoddard of New York, a progressive leader who assured the senator that the progressives of the country were back of him in his campaign.

Owing to his engagements the senator found difficulty in working on his speech of acceptance. The speech probably will be shorter in length than any utterance of similar nature delivered in years. The senator said he would leave certain subjects for more detailed discussion in subsequent addresses.

Major General Leonard Wood and Senator Cummings of Iowa, will confer with the senator tomorrow.

BUCKETT GIVES STATE POSITION

Addresses Majority of Landis Folks. Tells of Rights.

Salisbury N. C., July 10.—Addressing most of the inhabitants of the textile mill village of Landis, near here, late today, following a personal investigation of the trouble centering in the strike of several hundred operatives, Gov. T. W. Bickett gave warning that, if the owners desired to operate their mills and operatives wanted to go to work, which they had a perfect right to do, the state would furnish whatever protection was needed against those who might interfere.

The governor's address, delivered from an automobile in a grove while stores and all business houses closed that the people might hear him, followed conferences with representatives of the Lynn and Corriher mills under the same management, and representatives of the operatives. He also had a conference with disinterested citizens.

He declared that the mill owners had a right to discharge an employee if they had reason to believe it proper, that workers had a right to quit,
