DOMESTIC ISSUES

THEME OF ADDRESS
 Governor Coolidge Urges Nation to Solve the Problem of Reconstruction.
 Northampton, Mass., July 27.—Governor Coolidge, in an address formally accepting the Republican nomination for vice president at notification ceremonies here today urged the country to summon its forces to solve the problems of reconstruction. He devoted the greater part of his address to a discussion of domestic issues, but called first for "a return to a thorough peace basis because that is the fundamental American basis," and before domestic problems can be solved, he added, there must be a return from "the voluntary autocracy," established in the emergency of war, to a government as exercised under the doctrine of the separation of powers.

In discussing the league of nations, the governor commended the Republican senators for their opposition to the covenant without reservations as submitted by the President, terming "the league in that form subversive of the traditions and the independence of America," but the Republican party, he added, "approves the principles of agreement among nations to preserve peace, and pledges itself to the making of such an agreement, preserving American independence and rights as well, and meet every duty America owes to humanity."

The exercises were held on Allen Field, the athletic ground of Smith College, at 3 o'clock this afternoon, before a crowd of several thousand, which stood throughout the program, apparently unmindful of the scorching rays of the sun which had turned the ideal summer day of the morning into one of uncomfortable sultriness. The Governor spoke from a mound which formed a natural platform and stood under a canopy flanked at either side by the Stars and Stripes and the state flag of Massachusetts. With him on the platform were Senator Lodge, former Senator John W. Weeks, of Massachusetts, and other party leaders. A touch of the picturesque was added when an airplane flew low and dropped flowers upon the field.

Governor Coolidge's declaration in behalf of woman's suffrage was the signal for an enthusiastic demonstration. He said that he had always voted for it, but did not regard it as a party question. The Republican party, he said, "stands pledged to use its endeavors to hasten ratification, which I trust will be at once accomplished."

The address of notification was delivered by Governor Edwin P. Morrow of Kentucky.

BOY ELECTROCUTED
FOR KILLING "COP"
 Eighteen Year Old Elmer Hyatt Pays Death Penalty for Murder of a Policeman.
 Ossining, N. Y., July 29.—Eighteen year old Elmer Hyatt, the convicted Slayer of Patrolman O'Brien, of Rochester, was put to death in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison tonight.

Hyatt entered the death chamber to shouts of "Goodbye" from the other inmates of the death house. "Goodbye, boys," he called in return as he calmly walked to the chair, accompanied by the Rev. A. N. Petersen, Protestant chaplain of the prison.

Hyatt was the youngest person ever put to death in Sing Sing prison. He had not reached his eighteenth birthday when he shot and killed the Rochester policeman after an exchange of revolver shots.

During his imprisonment in the death house Hyatt was confident that Governor Smith would commute his sentence and he did not give up hope until the last.

"If the governor gives me a chance for life, I will make good," he said earlier in the day.

Hyatt's mother presented a petition to Governor Smith, bearing the names of several of the jurors who convicted the young man in her efforts to obtain clemency, but the governor declined to intervene.

His mother, Mrs. Thomas Doughty, and a brother and a sister paid a farewell visit to him this evening.

Killed a Policeman
 Rochester, N. Y., July 29.—Hyatt shot and killed Policeman William H. O'Brien on the night of May 2, 1919, in a revolver duel after O'Brien had surprised him in the act of burglarizing a house on Garson avenue. Hyatt attempted to escape but was stopped by a shot from a detective.

WALSH PLEDGES

SUPPORT TO COX
 Massachusetts Senator Who Opposes League Unamended Promises Loyal Aid.
 Dayton, O., July 29.—Governor Cox, Democratic presidential standard bearer, today was pledged the vigorous and unqualified support of Senator David I. Walsh, of Massachusetts, a leader among the senate Democrats who differed from the administration on the league of nations and who fought for reservations.

Senator Walsh arrived here unexpectedly today and was Governor Cox's guest at dinner before leaving for the east.

"I shall aid in every possible way to secure Governor Cox's election," said Mr. Walsh. "I voted for him from the first at San Francisco and shall continue my most loyal and vigorous aid."

Senator Walsh said he had not learned Governor Cox's position regarding reservations and other details in the league controversy, adding that he had not come here to discuss or advise with the candidate on that or any other subject. He called solely to talk over campaign affairs, he said, with D. J. Mahoney, Governor Cox's son-in-law, and while here the governor insisted upon tonight's visit to Trail's End. Even should he and the governor differ on the league, Senator Walsh said, he still would support the governor enthusiastically.

"He was the most progressive and liberal candidate in the field at San Francisco," Mr. Walsh added.

The senator was the sole visitor at Trail's end today. He arrived just when Governor Cox was finishing the first rough draft of his acceptance address, and preparing to be the guest of honor here tomorrow at the "homecoming" and non-political celebration.

Governor Cox dug all day on his speech of acceptance on August 7, of the party nomination. He aims to hold it within eight newspaper columns or 9,500 words and might be able to reduce it somewhat.

Hope that the league would not be the campaign's paramount issue was expressed by Senator Walsh, who led

the successful effort in the platform committee at San Francisco for the words in the league plank stating that the party does not oppose reservations making America's obligations clear and more specific.

"I hope we can devote more attention to American questions," said the senator to friends here, asserting that opposition to profiteering should be stressed.

The senator declared to visitors that he still favored league covenant reservations and would never vote for the league without reservations to article 10. The Republicans, he predicted, would seek to make reservation of Article 10 their principal fight and he said Governor Cox should be "very careful" what position he took.

Senator Walsh predicted the Irish questions would not be campaign issues.

"I don't think they will figure at all," he said. "People of Irish blood will vote just as they always have, Republican or Democratic, as Americans, regardless of their views on Irish independence."

Laurens Officers Praised.
 Some Belton people had been charged with speeding in Laurens county, and as I was a noficer, and from Laurens, they came to me and told me their troubles. 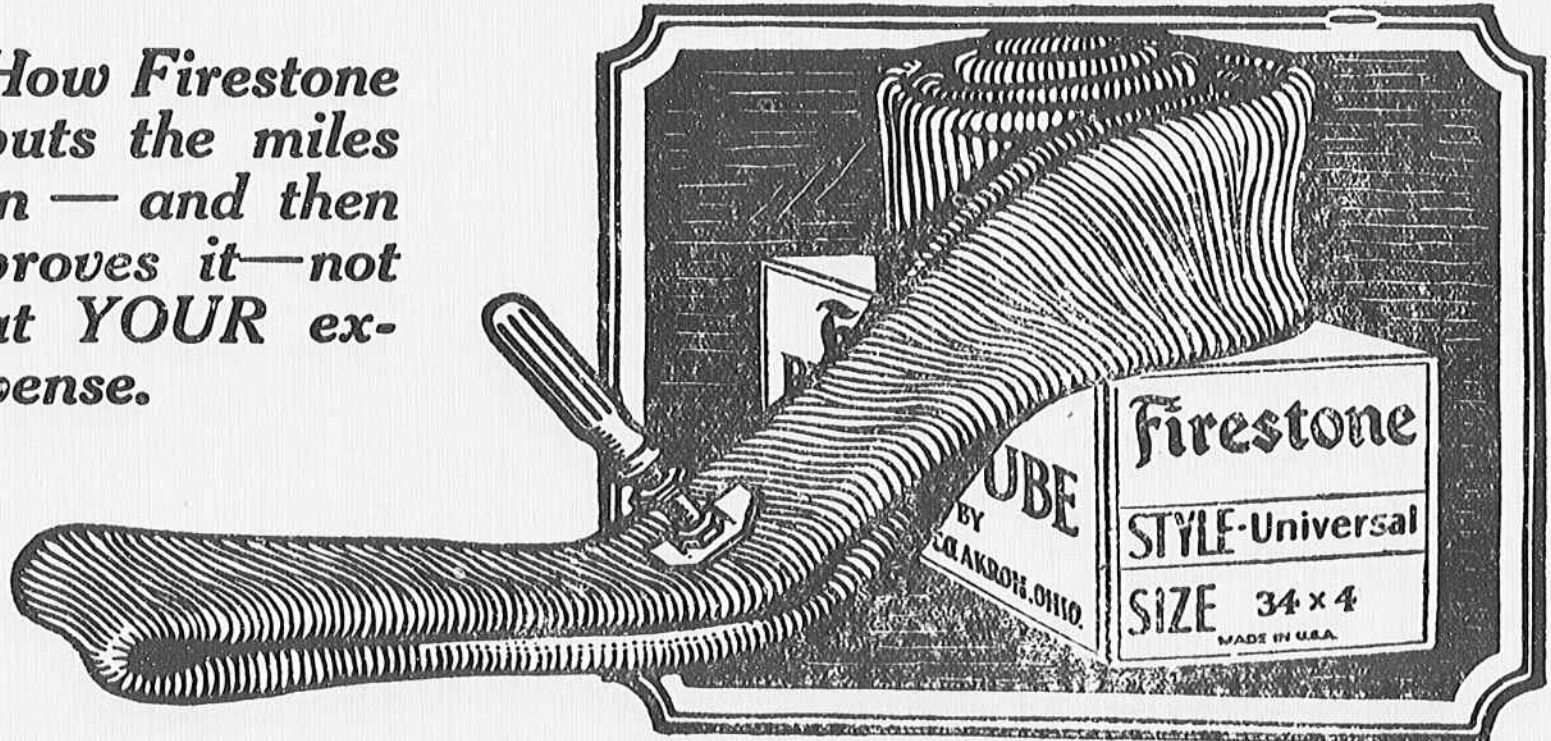
