Plans for Organization of Twelve Million Dollar Cotton Export Corporation Adopted at Meeting of Bankers and Representatives of Cotton Interests Held in Washington.

Washington, Oct. 21.—Plans for the organization of a \$12,000,000 cotton export and crop financing corporation were adopted at a meeting here late today of bankers and representatives of cotton interests attending the convention of the American Bankers' Association.

The meeting approved suggestions contained in a report of a committee, headed by Robert F. Maddox, Atlanta banker, to move at once in the direction of preliminary steps toward organizing the corporation. Tentative arrangements provide for the payment of half of the capital stock or an initial working fund of \$5,000,000 capital, and \$1,000,000 surplus.

Capital subscription, the plan suggests, will be based on an assessment of \$1 a bale on cotton raised in the respective states thereby making the organization one of far-reaching influence throughout all territory which has had difficulty in financing the movement of the cotton crop. The decision to call for the initial payment of only half of the total capital means therefore that the subscriptions will be prorated among the purchasers of stock on the basis of 50 cents per bale.

Under Edge Act

It was made clear by speakers at the meeting that the purposes of the corporation which will be organized under the Edge act amending the federal reserve act is not to hold the cotton crop but to insure the commodity be moved "at a time when the market is stagnant."

Under provisions of the Edge act, the corporation is enabled to handle trade acceptances—agreement of the purchasers to the amount of ten times its capital and surplus or, in the case of the proposed corporation the ability to handle acceptances of cotton purchasers to the amount of \$50,000,000.

Although there was no specific mention made there were indications that formation of the corporation would immediately open the way for the sale of cotton in Europe when the demand is estimated at three to four million bales.

No Broad Promises

The committee informed these in attendance at the meeting that it would make "no extravagant promises," but that it hoped that the establishment of such a corporation would be "of tremendous benefit" to the South. The meeting was told also that the corporation would not prove a "remedy for all ills," although it would make possible the provisions for market time in time of emergency as the cotton producers are now passing through.

Although the corporation may in the future extend its operations to other commodities, those in attendance urged that it devote its resources at first to the handling of this crop alone. The way was left open, however, for such enlargements and suggested extensions can be made, as needed, speakers declared.

Dallas, Oct. 21.—Assurance that the federal reserve board will co-operate with the farmers to the fullest extent by granting banks longer credit on cotton notes was given this morning by Judge W. H. Ramsey, federal agent for the federal reserve board in the Eleventh district, in addressing a statewide conference of ginners, bankers and business men here.

Judge Ramsey asserted that the financial condition of the nation is as good as it had ever been.

"The federal reserve bank will function properly in giving member banks longer time on cotton paper. Credit has been available for cotton as in other industries and I see no reason that credit should be discontinued," he said.

Judge Ramsey added that the federal reserve board of directors favors a system of gradual marketing of cotton but that they would not support an ironclad rule of holding cotton indefinitely. He urged unanimous support of a movement to organize a large export corporation, to establish credit and market the cotton crop and establishment of cotton warehouses to be maintained by the state.

Savannah, Oct. 21.—The Savannah Cotton Exchange and Savannah Clearing Association today endorsed the proposal of the American Bankers' Association for the organization of a \$12,000,000 corporation to finance foreign trade.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Oct. 21.—Gov. J. B. A. Robertson this afternoon sent a telegram to President Wilson offering "to join in a constructive or helpful movement to husband the interest of the cotton grower." He also sent a message to Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia expressing approval of a plan to organize an export finance corporation to take cotton off the hands of the growers.

CHINA BUILDING TEXTILE PLANTS

Manufacturing of Cotton Being Promoted. Nieh Tells of Plans. Will Never Become Competitor of United States in Large Field.

Greenville, Oct. 21.—A luncheon which was addressed by President Nieh, of the Chinese chamber of commerce, and head of the oldest cotton mill in China, was attended today by visitors to the Southern Textile exposition and by Greenville citizens.

Dr. Louis J. Matos, chemist for the National Aniline and Chemical company of New York, also made an address, telling the story of America's progress in dye making since the outbreak of the war in 1914. Dr. W. R. Cathcart of the Corn Products Refining company also spoke.

The fall convention of the Southern Textile association starts tomorrow to continue through Saturday. Today's attendance made another record but the exposition management expects the largest attendance tomorrow and Saturday.

In his address Mr. Nieh said that within the past year the Chinese have purchased equipment for 45 cotton mills from the United States and plans to purchase a great deal more. China now is familiar with American textile machinery and will go to no other nation to make its purchases, he stated. One of America's leading cotton experts is now in China to teach the people there how to develop in the growing of cotton.

The Cotton Mill Owners' association of China, Mr. Nieh said, is perfecting an organization to promote and protect cotton growing. Thirty experimental stations have been established under the supervision of the American expert, and cotton of a much better grade than formerly was used is being grown.

Within the past year the number of spindles in his country has been virtually doubled, Mr. Nieh said. The number now running to about 2,500,000. Within a short while the number will likely reach 3,000,000. As the industry develops, China will come to America more and more for supplies.

This seeming competition with America and particularly with the South will in no wise injure America's business, Mr. Nieh declared, but on the other hand, should increase the prosperity of this nation in a number of ways.

As more mills are built in China and more of that country's poor are given employment, paying good wages, the consumption of cotton goods will grow far greater than China alone can ever hope to supply. This should mean the doubling and tripling of American exports to China. "We can not hope to keep pace with the development," Mr. Nieh said.

So pleased was Mr. Nieh with the exposition that he announced that he plans to have an exposition modeled after this one held in China within the shortest time possible in order that the Chinese might have the educational advantages of such a show. Also, he said that the plan to have technical textile department, similar to those in America, added to several Chinese educational institutions.

Mr. Nieh said he is here particularly to purchase spinning frames, looms and allied requisites for new mills to be built in China. Americans, he said, are the most wonderfully progressive people in the world.

EXPENSE ACCOUNT

G. O. P. \$2,741,503

Upham Announces Total Disbursement of Committee Between June and October.

Washington, Oct. 22.—Total disbursements of the Republican National Committee between June 14 and October 18, of this year were placed at \$2,741,503.34, in an official statement filed today with the clerk of the House of Representatives by Fred W. Upham, treasurer of the National Committee. Receipts for the period were placed at \$2,466,019.54.

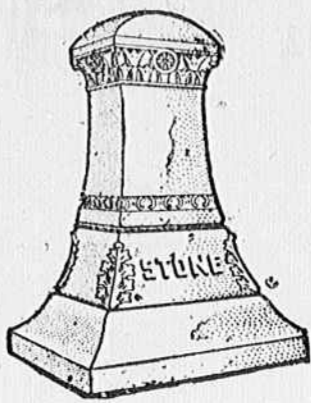
The statement placed the number of contributors at 34,867, and added that only sixteen contributions in excess of \$1,000 had been received. These 16 contributions, it added aggregated \$38,750. The Hamilton Club, Chicago, was named as largest single contributor with \$6,120.50.

The committee's announcement said other contributions ranged "from 25 cents to \$1,000 and cover the entire country."

"Treasurer Upham reports," it added, "that contributions for state committees were received to the amount of \$1,015,618.61, and transmitted by him as agent to state committees.

"The sum of \$333,500 was borrowed for use by the senatorial and congressional committees and loaned to these committees."

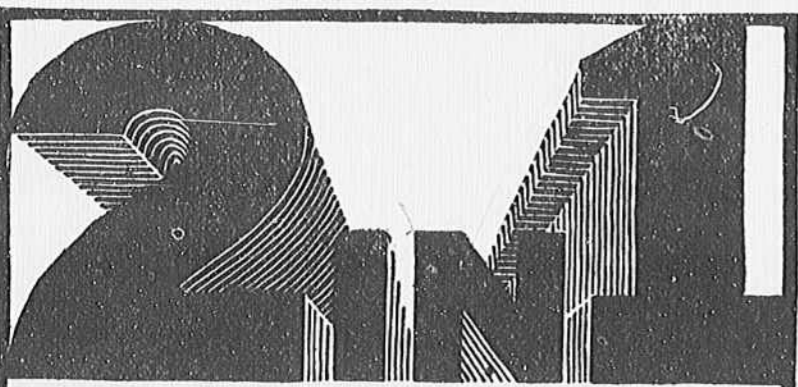
LAND SURVEYING EXAMPLE
