It is the duty of patriotic citizens to go to the polls next Tuesday and vote. The general election is of no particular interest in this state, as the nominees of the Democratic party on the state ticket will be elected for a certainty and the state will go overwhelmingly Democratic as usual, but voting is a duty which we should not avoid.

Send in Subscriptions

Mr. C. A. Power, chairman in charge of subscriptions for the cotton corporation, asks that all soliciting committees send in their reports immediately so that a county report may be sent to Columbia. Up until Tuesday morning the total amount reported as subscribed in the county was the equivalent of about \$35,000 in cotton, Liberty Bonds and cash.

Although the League of Nations is supposed to be the issue in the election next Tuesday, partisan politicians have so distorted the facts of the covenant and brought other issues prominently to the front that a real sentiment on the league will hardly be expressed at the polls. Nevertheless the fate of the league hangs in the balance and its fate will be decided along with the other issues. The financial stringency of the past few months is doubtless having more effect on the campaign than the league of nations and the labor vote will not be a negligible factor. Whatever may be the outcome of the election, the Democrats may comfort themselves in the thought that they have tried to create a strong wall against the devastations of future wars and if they fail the fault may be laid at the doors of others.

Hicks Owines in Washington

Lieut. Col. Hicks L. Owings, right hower to Sheriff Reid in the apprehension of fugitives from justice, spent a few days in Washington last week trying to fix the manacles of South Carolina justice on one Callie Watts, wanted in this county for assault and battery upon the person of Will Sulzer, near Clinton about seven years ago. Col. Owings went up with extradition papers signed by Gov. Cooper, but Callie hired a couple of Washington lawyers and succeeded in staying in his adopted home for a while longer at least. The proceedings necessitated some delay, so the Laurens peace officer took the occasion to look over the city for a spell. Among others whom he visited in his rounds was Senator N. B. Dial, or rather he tried to visit him and failed. The Senator was then in New York working in the interest of the cotton farmers and naturally could not be seen at such a distance. From what he could learn, he said, the senator was making things fly around Washington and if anything can be done to help the price of cotton, Senator Dial will do it. The deputy sheriff said he did not get to see President Wilson, but risked one eye on the White House and that is about as far as he got in that direction.

WOMEN GIVE CAMPAIGN FUND BIG BOOST
