## LIFE SENTENCE FOR

YOUNG MAN

Fred Hempley Convicted of Murder Charge. Mercy Recommended.

Spartanburg, Oct. 30 .- After two and one-half hours deliberation the jury in the case of A. Fred Hempley, young Inman farmer, charged with the murder of Don Beckoff, local automobile dealer, brought in a verdict of guilty with a recommendation to mercy. Judge Townsend immediately sentenced Hempley to the state penitentiary for the remainder of his natural life.

The convicted man stood in the dock with a debonair demeanor while sentence was passed and then went quietly to his cell, in the county jail, where he has been sinec his arest on September 16. The entire day was consumed by arguments of counsel, three attorneys speaking for the state, while two addressed the jury in Hempley's behalf. Judge

cend's charge consumed more than 30 minutes.

The verdict marked the end of a trial that has attracted more interest possibly than any other case in the history of Spartanburg county. The court room was packed from the moment the trial began Thursay morning, and hundreds were unable to get in. Hempley's friends and relatives were in constant attendance upon the trial and appeared confident that the young farmer would be acquitted. The defendant was represented by Congressman Sam J. Nicholls and Cecil C. Wyche, while Solicitor Blackwood was assisted by C. Erskine Daniel and James W. Mackey, the latter from Marshall, Mich., where the murdered man operated an automobile business similar to that in this city.
