

GREENVILLE FARMER KILLED ON THE LAURENS ROAD

Slayer of Asa Flinkenshelt Escaped Probably to Kentucky and Has Not Been Located. Slayer and Victim Together Night Before.

Greenville, Nov. 7.—As a result of the killing at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon of Asa Flinkenshelt, 44, at his home on the Laurens road, Sheriff Sam D. Willis and his deputies are searching for James E. Salmon, 26, on a charge of murder.

Up to a late hour last night no word had been received from Sheriff Willis, who had taken up the trail and was traveling by auto in another state in search of the young man. A full description of Salmon was wired to officers in cities and towns throughout the state and section. Deputies in Greenville spent the afternoon and night working on the case, but no information further than some which they said strengthened the belief that Salmon was the man found.

The man suspected is from Morganton, N. C., near Asheville, and had been in Greenville, but three or four days. Unconfirmed information reaching the sheriff was to the effect that he, with Flinkenshelt and a woman whose identity has not been positively established were together on Thursday night. The theory has been advanced by some officers that robbery was not the motive of the crime, although the guilty man took cash amounting to about \$300 from the Flinkenshelt home after the killing; but this belief has likewise not received confirmation in the shape of evidence.

According to witnesses who were at the Flinkenshelt home when the shooting occurred a young man drove up to the house about 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. In the car which was an Overland Four or a Ford, was a young woman, who remained in her seat while the man went to the Flinkenshelt home. The man walked to the house, which is situated down a lone some 200 yards from the main highway, and entered.

Emma, 12-year old daughter of Flinkenshelt, told officers that the young man first asked for a match, which she supplied. Victoria Pruitt, a negro cook, then called Flinkenshelt at the young man's direction, and the owner of the house, and the small farm on which it is situated, appeared. After a moment's conversation, the witnesses said that the young man drew a pistol and ordered Flinkenshelt to walk to a tree several yards from the house.

Searched Him.
Larry, 14-year-old son of Flinkenshelt, who was in a field picking cotton near the house, said that he saw the young man search his father at the point of the gun, and then march him back to the house.

On returning to the house, it is gathered from reports reaching officers that the two went into a front room. After a brief period of time, three or five shots rang out and Flinkenshelt dropped to the floor dead. The young man, it is alleged, then entered a bedroom in which Mrs. Flinkenshelt lay ill in bed, having been confined to the room for some time. He then forced her to give up the roll of bills which were kept in the bed, and made his departure. Mrs. Flinkenshelt was left unconscious though she soon regained her sense. Because of her nervous collapse, officers did not question her closely in regard to the affair.

After getting back into his car, the young man is believed to have turned toward Greenville again, from which direction he had driven to the Flinkenshelt home. The house in which the killing occurred is hardly half a mile beyond the city limits and stands on a hill not far beyond the home of the late Sheriff Hendrix Rector.

Fought Woman
One new bit of evidence in regard to the affair, and one which caused officers to believe Salmon to be the man, was the disclosure obtained by Sheriff Willis yesterday afternoon that Salmon forced Miss Amber Robinson to give him her pistol half an hour before the Flinkenshelt shooting.

Miss Robinson, who lives with her sister at Duncan, told the sheriff that Salmon, who was almost a stranger to her, entered her home and asked for a gun. He did not wait, she said, for her to give him the gun peacefully, but made her do it by main force. Salmon moved to the Duncan village three days ago and obtained quarters in a Hale street home, and there he became acquainted with Miss Robinson. Salmon assigned no reason, she said, for wanting the gun.

Boarded Train?
Late reports reaching Greenville last night were to the effect that a man answering Salmon's description had bought a ticket for a Kentucky point and had boarded a train in Spartanburg in the afternoon, and that the man who did the shooting here

left his woman companion in or near Greer immediately upon reaching that town.

It was also reported that the amount of which Mrs. Flinkenshelt was robbed was nearer \$500 than \$300.

SALMON YET MISSING

No Trace Found in Kentucky of Man Wanted.

Greenville, Nov. 7.—Officers here who believe that James E. Salmon, young man wanted for the killing on Friday of Asa Flinkenshelt, farmer, in the vicinity of Louisville, Ky., stated tonight that officers in Louisville report that they have been unable as yet to get any trace of him. Sheriff Willis today returned from Morganton, N. C., the home of Salmon where he has been working on the case for the past two days. The woman who went to the Flinkenshelt house with Salmon, Mrs. Alice Aiken, is still being held as a witness and officers state that they do not expect to bring charges against her.
