

**J. D. ROCKEFELLER
ATTACKED FOR GIFT**

N. Y. State Federation of Labor Assails Him for Gift to Education Board.

New York, Feb. 20.—An attack against John D. Rockefeller for his recent donation of \$70,000,000 to the general education board was made in a statement issued tonight by the New York State Federation of Labor. The statement, made public by Peter J. Brady, head of the federation's committee on education, declared the gift, as well as other activities of the board, were moves to place academic freedom in control of a capitalistic system.

"The millions donated to the general education board," said the statement, "have been accumulated as a result of a type of industrial and financial control that characterized one of the darkest pages on our economic history. The acquisition of the swollen fortune that John D. Rockefeller now distributes would never have been possible under an enlightened social system."

"However, apart from the taint which besmirches such wealth, organized labor objects vehemently to its distribution to educational institutions. It is inconceivable that under a proper mode of government, educational institutions that serve a vital function in our body politic, shall not derive needed revenues from the municipality, the state or the federal government, rather than the millions from this donor."

"The \$70,000,000 donation was made by Mr. Rockefeller a few weeks ago, \$50,000,000 of which was given to various colleges and universities for aid in increasing teachers' salaries and \$20,000,000 for the improvement of medical education."

The labor statement quoted the federal industrial relations commission appointed by President Wilson as saying of the Rockefeller foundation:

"The money with which the Rockefeller foundation was created and is maintained consists of the wages of workers in American industries. These wages are withheld by means of economic pressure, violation of law, cunning and disorder practiced over a series of years by the founder and certain of his business associates."

continued the statement, "that substituted the statement, 'that subsidies such as those granted by the general education board, even though

unaccompanied by written specific conditions or reservations, can not but undermine, to a degree, democratic independence in higher educational institutions."

**HARDING WON'T PLAY
FOR STAKES AT GOLF**

Willing to Meet Pope But Not With Greenville Office as Prize.

St. Augustine, Fla., Feb. 19.—Another projected classic of the world of sport went by the boards today when President-elect Harding declined a challenge from the postmaster at Greenville, S. C., to match skill with him on the golf links with a re-appointment to the postmastership as a stake. To the challenger's manager, Mr. Harding wrote that he regarded himself as only a miserable player and was unwilling "to have the administration weakened by basing its attitude on my incapacity at golf."

But he added that he liked the postmaster's "sporty inclination," and if the conditions of the challenge were removed, he was willing to accept a match whenever opportunity offered.

The proposal to play for the postmastership was made in formal fashion by Louis Sherfessee, who described himself as self-appointed manager for the postmaster, Thomas H. Pope, a Wilson appointee.

Writing to Mr. Sherfessee, the president-elect said to Mr. Pope that he felt it would be safer to recommitment him on the advice of his friends than to risk the appointment on the fortunes of the links.

"As a matter of fact," Mr. Harding's letter added, "I am giving no consideration at this time to any of the district appointments and I take it that Mr. Pope can sit easy for the present and have no worry about his situation. The ultimate course of the administration is quite another, though I am sure there has been no definite policy decided upon."

Greenville, Feb. 19.—Postmaster Thomas H. Pope, who challenged President-elect Harding to a game of golf to decide whether he should be reappointed postmaster at Greenville, today announced that it is agreeable with him to withdraw the stake. He said he cherishes a lively desire to match his skill with Mr. Harding on the links. Mr. Pope's manager Louis Sherfessee, suggests that the game be played in Washington next May.

**CHESTER SHERIFF
WOUNDED IN RAID**

Receives Load in Neck on Entering House. Mystery Surrounds.

Chester, Feb. 19.—Sheriff D. G. Anderson of Chester county was shot in the neck this afternoon and is at the Chester sanatorium, where he was brought immediately.

Sheriff Anderson and Deputy J. G. Howze and Constable R. G. Smith had gone to the McAfee place, about nine miles from Chester, for the purpose of locating a still, and it was while they were hunting the still that the wound was received. Sheriff Anderson had attempted to enter a negro house, but found all doors locked, and went through the kitchen window. From the kitchen he was entering another room in the house, when the shotgun went off, a part of the load striking him in the fleshy part of the neck, just below the chin. It is thought that when he opened the door the gun, which belonged to the negroes living in the house fell or had been set so that it would shoot when any one opened the door.

It was seen that Sheriff Anderson was possibly dangerously wounded and those with him immediately rushed him to Chester for medical attention. Hence the actual surroundings in the house were not investigated, and it is not certain that there was any one in the house at the time the gun went off.
