**BULL ASSOCIATION SHOW SUCCESSFUL**

Much Interest and Enthusiasm Shown in First Show of Laurens Bull Association.

Much interest and enthusiasm were shown in the first livestock show of the Laurens Bull Association held at Gray Court-Owings on Saturday, March 12, says J. B. Parker, Extension Dairy husbandman, and the event was a success from every angle. The show consisted of exhibits of the association bulls and several classes of daughters of association bulls and of a judging contest among the agricultural classes of high schools in the county, won by Gray Court-Owings school.

The Laurens association has five blocks, and all bulls were present. The leading bull of the association, Gedney Farm Suzanne's Led 2nd, 107,377, is a grandson of the well known Oxford Lad, and is a source of great pride among the association members. The other four bulls were all bred by the late J. A. Shanklin and are fine specimens of high breeding.

A total of 25 entries in the several classes of daughters made a most impressive educational exhibit, proving that "blood will tell." Mr. W. H. 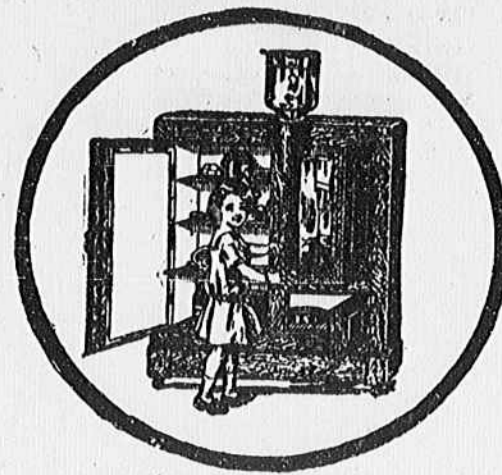
Doctor Loveland's lecture fills a genuine need in these days of baffling social and economic unrest.
